Good morning. 4 5 I'd like to call the Lottery Commission meeting to 6 order. Today is February the 10th, it is 8:35. We 7 have all Commissioners present, we have a quorum. 8 Commissioner Steen and some staff are participating 9 today via video conference which is allowed in the Open 10 Meetings Act. We will start with the U.S. Pledge and 11 then the Texas. 12 (Pledges recited) 1.3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. 14 AGENDA ITEM NO. II 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. First item is 16 the annual independent audit. Kathy, this is your 17 item. 18 MS. PYKA: Good morning, Commissioners. 19 My name is Kathy Pyka, Controller for the agency. With 20 me this morning is Mr. Kevin Sanford. He is the 21 engagement partner for the firm Weaver and Tidwell. 22 They performed our required annual financial audit for 23 the fiscal year 2021 financials. Kevin, I'll let you

Kathy. Good morning, Commissioners, good morning,
Director Grief, it's my pleasure to be here today. As
Kathy mentioned, my name is Kevin Sanford, I'm a
partner with the firm Weaver and Tidwell and an honor
to be here to present the results of our audit for the
Lottery Commission for the year ended August 31st,
2021.

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I'll say while I have a brief presentation only kind of highlighting the key points of the audit, if at any time or at the end, you'd like me to dig in to anymore information or talk to anymore specifics, please don't hesitate to interrupt.

The first item to highlight is our opinion on the financial statements, which if you're looking either at a printed copy or a bound copy, it is the first item in the financial section and it's on page 4 of the document, and it's on our letterhead.

Our opinion once again this year is an unmodified or unqualified opinion. It's the highest level of assurance that independent auditors can provide to a set of financial statements and it states that in all material respects these financials are accurately presented.

And then you'll also notice in the back of the document on page 77, there is one more report

from us. The Lottery, as a state agency in the State of Texas, is under governmental auditing standards and commensurate with that audit, we have to perform tests of internal controls over financial reporting of the Lottery Commission, as well as tests of the key matters of compliance in other matters. And while our testing of internal control is not to the point to render an opinion, any testing that we do is substantial and any findings we have would have to be brought forward to you in this report.

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internal controls there were no significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in the Lottery's internal control, nor were there any findings under key matters of compliance and other matters. So, in all respects it is a clean report from us on the Commission's financial statements, as well as its internal controls and key matters of compliance.

And so the last item from us is a letter from us to you with our required communications for the audit as the Board of Commissioners is responsible for the oversight of us as auditors. And really, I wasn't going to highlight anything in here, it's kind of the standard boilerplate language with our required communications, nothing adverse, nothing out of the

ordinary. But again, if anything in the financial 1 2 statements or in this letter you would like me to dive 3 into a little bit more, I'm happy to do so. CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 4 5 any questions? Okay. Good job. 6 MR. SANFORD: Thank you. 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. 8 MS. PYKA: Thank you, Commissioners. 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Very Good. 10 AGENDA ITEM NO. III 11 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. The next item 12 in our report is from the BAC, Trace, it's your item. 1.3 MR. SMITH: Good morning, Chairman, 14 Commissioners, staff. Our last meeting was on the 26th 1.5 of January, we had six members in attendance. 16 Unfortunately, our Vice Chair, Kim Rogers, had to 17 resign due to time and family constraints. Kim was a 18 valuable asset to BAC and the industry and will be 19 sorely missed. 20 So, BAC would like to ask the 21 Commissioners to reopen the application process to fill 22 the vacant position for Kim Rogers. 23 Also, the BAC is still working on points 24 to revive the website and make it more user friendly.

We also heard opinions on recommending removing the

8	more convenient for her staff to do their audits and
9	reports, and we agreed to come up with some ideas to
10	help them with that.

MR. WOLFE: Good morning. Thank you,
Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. For the record, I'm
Kyle Wolfe, Assistant General Counsel. Item VII in
your notebooks, which is an action item, contains
proposal to adopt amendments to the eight draw game
rules in that item. The proposed amendments to the
Lotto Texas and Powerball rules increase the number of
consecutive draws a player can purchase in those draw
games.

The proposed amendments also consolidate similar provisions from seven separate draw game rules into the general draw game rule. Those provisions being consolidated concern a player's verification of numbers and other selections on lottery tickets.

On this action item, the staff is recommending that the Commission initiate the rulemaking process by publishing these proposed amendments in the Texas Register to receive public

1	comment for a period of 30 days.

budget.

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Commissioners, our first slide that we have for you this morning will begin with slide 2, comparative sales through the week ending February 5th, 2022, presented at the bottom of the slide. Total fiscal year 2022 sales through this 23-week period are \$3,525,000,000. That is an increase of \$100-million over our fiscal year 2021 sales or 2.9 percent.

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Commissioners, when we met in December, we discussed our concern about what our year-over-year increase might look like after the comparison to the one billion Mega Millions jackpot that occurred in January of '21, as well as the very large Powerball jackpot that reached 730-million in 2021, so we're super pleased that we passed that hurdle and we still have a \$100-million increase over fiscal year 2021.

As we look at the individual sales numbers, our fiscal year 2022 scratch sales, which are reflected on the second orange bar, are \$2,856,000,000 which is a \$174-million increase over the sales figure for fiscal year 2021.

Our current scratch ticket growth rate is six and a half percent over last fiscal year. Our scratch ticket sales this fiscal year amount to 81 percent of total lottery sales in comparison to last fiscal year, which was 78.3 percent of total lottery

sales.

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In our fiscal year 2022 draw sales reflected on the second blue bar are 668-million, which is a \$74-million increase or, excuse me, \$74-million decrease, or just under 10 percent below fiscal year 2021.

Robert will now provide a detailed overview of sales by product.

MR. TIRLONI: Thank you, Kathy. Good morning, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners. This is our year-over-year comparison. This is through last Saturday, February 5th. We start at the bottom of the slide. We are up \$100-million compared to last fiscal. We can dig a little deeper and see where that growth is coming from.

Scratch tickets on the line right above that are up almost \$174-million. We did have some tough weeks in January, tough comparison weeks this year compared to last due to the large jackpots we had, which also drove very strong scratch sales last January. So, we are up 174.

If you look right above that, though, you can see for our draw games those are down almost \$74-million. Why is that? Large jackpots in January of '21, the overwhelming majority of that decline is

coming from the jackpot portion of the portfolio.

That's up at the top in the white font. The jackpot games are down 73-million year-over-year.

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Quick reminder, in January of '21 we had a \$730-million Powerball jackpot and we had a \$1-billion Mega Millions jackpot.

We were lucky that both games did start rolling this past fall. They rolled into January, they just didn't quite get up to the levels we saw a year ago. Mega Millions made it up to 421-million and Powerball got up to 630-million. So, you know, the \$421-million jackpot could not compete with the 1-billion from a year ago and that's why we're seeing an \$87-million decline for Mega Millions and the add-on games for Mega Millions are down about 12.8-million.

We still are in the positive for Powerball and Power Play, again that's thanks to us getting up to 630-million just a month ago.

Lotto Texas is down and Texas Two Step is down. Again, this is all jackpot driven, jackpot related.

In the middle of the slide in blue are our daily games. Almost breaking even, slightly down \$800,000, Pick 3 is down about 1.6-million, that's almost made up for with the growth on Daily 4, that's

up 1.2. Cash 5 is down 700,000, but All or Nothing is up \$400,000. So again, draw games down 73.7, netting out at 100-million growth.

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I guess if there's good news about the jackpot situation is that last year, once we got past those very large jackpots in January, there was not any humongous jackpots for the remainder of the fiscal year. One jackpot got up to 515-million in May. So, hopefully Powerball or Mega Millions can get a decent jackpot run sometime the rest of this fiscal year and we can add to the growth that we're already seeing for Powerball, and hopefully we can minimize the losses that we're experiencing on Mega Millions.

For scratch we have a solid game plan going forward and we will continue to update you on sales in future meetings.

And with that, Ryan's going to proceed with an update on our advertising budget.

MR. MINDELL: Thank you, Robert, and good morning, Chairman and Commissioners. For the record, my name's Ryan Mindell, I'm the Lottery Operations Director.

Thought it would be good, given the budget cuts that you know we faced over the past few years to give you an overview of where our advertising

budget stands today, an outline of some of those strategic considerations we took into account as we managed those budget cuts and give you a couple of examples of what we have in the market.

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So, the next slide I just want to walk through again some of the strategic reasons as we face this drastic decline. As you know, we've gone from 32-million down to 10-million. That's almost a 69 percent decrease in a relatively short amount of time.

With managing those budget cuts, we've tried to maintain where we can long-term commitments. For instance, we have Jackpot billboards in key locations where we've been for almost if not longer than 20 years around the state.

We've had to move out of different mediums like radio and TV which are unfortunately a little too expensive for our current budget and don't allow us the flexibility to match the current budget levels.

In turn, we've moved more into digital platforms like social, mobile and web and also, maintain some flexibility with our campaign billboards where we can put them in certain markets around the state. We've also really kept our focus on in-store what we call point of sale. That's, you know, items

right at retail, right where the customer can see them at the time of purchase. We've also looked to move functionality in-house where we can and try to be a little bit again, more flexible and responsive to the budgets we have.

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So, with that on the next slide, I'll walk through our budget as it stands for this fiscal year.

As you can see, there's a large commitment to those jackpot billboards around the state. And again, these are places that if we stepped out of because of these budget cuts, we may never be able to get back in to those locations. And when you hear Robert and Kathy talk about how the jackpot sales drive both the sales for that game, but also across the portfolio, those jackpot billboards are one of the only ways we have to communicate those high jackpots to our players around the state.

We've also, as I've said, moved more into digital, although it still remains a relatively small portion of the portfolio, it gives us that flexibility and if we have additional funds or savings from other categories, we find that's a good place to talk to players in a way that we maybe didn't before these budget cuts.

Obviously, the campaign billboards on point of sale, those are part of our advertising campaigns for our major scratch ticket launches. I'll talk a little bit more about those in a moment. We have statutorily required end of game ads, and then obviously, the contractual expenses with our ad agency. As you know and as approved recently, we're in the middle of an RFP process for the new ad agency contract, which I hope will be bring some of those numbers down a little bit.

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On the next slide, I just want to give you a couple examples of the billboards that I talked about. So, on the one side you see the jackpot billboards. And again, those are the key drivers of jackpot awareness around the state. I'm sure you've all seen them in all the markets we have. We have 95 of those. And again, these are places that we've had these billboards for a very long time. We get to advertise both Powerball and Mega Millions and you know, they update daily and again, we just think those are in key locations.

On the other side, you'll see what we call the campaign billboards. So, those are rotating messages, those are focused on key scratch campaigns that we do throughout the year. Those we've had to

limit the reach of those and put them into fewer and fewer markets as our budgets are cut, but we still think they're a strong piece of the portfolio when we talk about these major scratch launches we have.

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On the next slide, I'll just walk through what those scratch launches look like. So, in previous years before we had these budget cuts, we would come out with what we call a campaign to support scratch tickets, five or six times a year. With the budget cuts, we had to strip down to the four essential scratch launches we do, and that would be the three what we call families. It's a suite of tickets at multiple price points that have a similar theme or look and feel. And those launch in September, January, and May usually, and we're able to support those with those campaign billboards you just saw, some digital pieces, and also, those point of sale right at retail.

We also try to support the holiday suite of tickets that comes out a little bit before the holidays with some point of sale in the market as well. So again, this is just a very high level overview of the strategic considerations we've managed this budget cut and a snapshot of where we stand today.

Happy to answer any questions about them.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Any questions?
Okay. Good job.

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COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Mr. Chairman, I would just say back to Robert and the whole team, that was kind of making up more than the loss that we all kind of knew was going to come if we didn't get those jackpots. I mean, well done on the scratch increase that we way more made up for that loss, and so that's the one thing that you guys can control, so I just want to congratulate you on that. And the other is just, you know, we're kind of at the whim of the rolling jackpot, so, thank you for that.

MR. MINDELL: Thank you.

AGENDA ITEM NO. IX

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item, state and agency budget status. Kathy?

MS. PYKA: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Again, Tab 9 includes the agency's transfers to the

State, as well as agency's budget status. The report
in your notebook reflects accrued revenue transfers and
the allocations to the Foundation School Fund and the

Texas Veterans Commission, as well as the allocation of
unclaimed lottery prizes for the four month period
ending December 31st of 2021.

Our total accrued revenue transfers to

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the State amounted to \$563.6-million for the first four months of the fiscal year. Of that \$563.6-million, \$540.7-million was transferred to the Foundation School Fund, 5.9-million was transferred to the fund for Veterans Assistance, and the balance of \$17-million was transferred as unclaimed lottery prizes. This leaves us with a 10.1 percent increase or \$49-million over revenue transfers to the Foundation School Fund for the same period last fiscal year.

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Our total cumulative transfers to the Foundation School Fund through December of this year include now \$28.2-billion.

Also, included in your notebook is the fiscal year 2022 method of finance summary for the first quarter ended November 30th of 2021. The Commission's lottery account budget for fiscal year 2022 is \$263.8-million of which 71.8 percent was expended and obligated through the end of the first quarter. The bingo administration budget funded by general revenue is just over \$2-million, with 92 percent of that obligated through the end of the first quarter.

I'd be happy to answer any questions.

11	So, in your binder today, I have a
12	status report of our activities. This past quarter
13	we've reviewed the network access and we're happy to
14	report that there were no unauthorized user accounts on
15	your network. We continue to work on Charitable Bingo
16	reconciliations. We've also started the audit of
17	agency wide performance measures and ticket management.
18	Those were our activities for this
19	period and if you have any questions, I'll be happy to
20	address them.
21	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioners, any
22	questions? No? Okay. Thank you.
23	AGENDA ITEM NO. XI
24	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is
25	Bingo Director report. LaDonna?

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MS. CASTAÑUELA: Good morning, Chairman and Commissioners. For the record, I'm LaDonna Castañuela, Director of Charitable Bingo Operations Division. Information concerning output metrics for CBOD for December and January can be found in your notebook materials.

I just have a quick update about
Division activities. In addition to the work detailed
in the notebook materials, we are busy on projects
associated with the upcoming move, records retention,
and procedure documentation, including procedures for
reporting performance standards in preparation for the
related internal audit that Darlene just mentioned. A
few of those are outdated and need revisions, while
others have never been drafted before.

Another project that was also mentioned by Trace just a minute ago that I'm working on is looking for ways to increase the number of license holders who file quarterly reports online. At this time, 40 percent of all quarterly reports are filed by mail, requiring CBOD staff to spend many hours each quarter manually processing them and data entering the reports into the BOSS database. If we could cut that number in half or more, it would free up staff to spend more time on other important office projects, cross

training and other professional development. 1 2 I'm grateful for the support offered by 3 the BAC who allowed me to present the issue at their last meeting. We're in the very earliest stages of 4 5 this project and I'm encouraged by the response so far. 6 I also want to let you know that we've 7 been working on filling vacancies in the Division. will have a new auditor in our Austin office next week 8 9 and hopefully a new auditor in the San Antonio office a 10 few weeks after that. There's currently a vacancy 11 posted for a license specialist and I hope we're able 12 to bring he or she on board before the April meeting. 1.3 That's all I have for you today; I'm 14 available to answer any questions. 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. MR. GRIEF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
Other than what's in your notebook this morning,
Commissioners, I have two items to report on.

The first is our upcoming move. Oh sorry, just a moment.

(Pause)

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MR. GRIEF: Are we good, Phillip?

MR. BATES: We've got you.

MR. GRIEF: Okay. The first item is our upcoming move to the new George H.W. Bush state office building at 1801 Congress. According to the Texas Facilities Commission, the construction is on schedule and we are tentatively planning to move the majority of our staff and equipment in late April or early May. Our claims center and draw studio, which are going to be located on the first floor of the new building, won't be moving until June 4th.

The bulk of our staff are going to be located on the fifth and sixth floors of the new building and along with the Texas Racing Commission, we will be the first two agencies to move into the new facility. At this point, the basic office spaces are complete and the final finish out work is underway.

The Department of Information Resources is in the process of installing the network infrastructure and the modular furniture for our agency is being delivered as we speak and is going to be installed throughout the month of February.

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In the new building, it will have a commission meeting space for use by all the state agencies who will be occupying the building. That will be on a reservation basis. At this time, we're a little uncertain if that commission meeting space is going to be ready for April or even possibly for June commission meetings, but if not, we will have our current space still under lease through August and we'll adjust the location of those meetings as we need to.

Mr. Chairman, my final item to report on this morning is the most important item of the day and that is the imminent retirement of our agency Controller, Kathy Pyka. So, I would like to ask Kathy to come forward and sit at the table if she would.

Commissioners, Kathy's last day in the office will be February 18th and Mr. Chairman, I think you wanted to kick us off on this item.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yes. Kathy, just the work that you've done for as long as you have is

You have an incredible amount of, you know, pluses and minuses to budget, a lot of budget cuts, a lot of additions, a lot of, you know, everything, right? It's a perpetually --

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: -- moving, you know, spreadsheet.

MS. PYKA: A lot of negatives.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yeah.

MS. PYKA: Unfortunately.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: So, well, you know, regardless of how many budget cuts there are, the important thing is that, you know, we can always move, you know, forward, right? You can always add to that balance sheet. But the reduction of you personally is going to be a budget cut that's going to be very difficult for us collectively to endure and your presence will remain as you've set it, a very high standard of work ethic, of, you know, commitment to the Texas Lottery, and on behalf of all of our Commissioners, we are incredibly grateful for all of

your years of service and you will be deeply missed.

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Thank you so much, Mr. MS. PYKA: Chairman, Commissioners. It's been a great honor to be part of this agency. I think that you know the amazing team that I get to work for led by Gary is one of the best executive teams in state government, and, you know, I've had some experiences at other places, so I think I'm a pretty good judge of that after so many incredible years here. But I appreciate all of y'all's support and you can only very well imagine the amazing team that I have in the Office of the Controller and the great things that they do, you well know that I just get to lead it. I have an amazing team that supports me. So, I appreciate all of y'all's support as well. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you. And Commissioners, any other comments? Okay. I'm sorry.

COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Just one. I think it's easy to kind of gloss over when we get these audit reports and financial and all, but for every single audit that I've been on this Commission for, we have been spotless. That is not an easy thing and like I said, that's easy to, you know, it's just financial gobbledygook, that's hard to do, and particularly in an agency this complex.

So, I really want to thank you and you are going to be sorely missed.

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MS. PYKA: Thank you. Those audited financials did not quite look like that many, many years ago, but we've really worked hard to place an amazing set of standards in and I have full confidence that under Kelly's leadership that that will continue, that that financial product will be just as good as it is today, so, but I appreciate that. It's a lot of work, no doubt.

COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Well, it makes our job much easier, so thank you.

MS. PYKA: Yes.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay.

MR. GRIEF: Well, of course, I'm not going to let Kathy off that easy, so, let me start off by congratulating Kathy, not only on her retirement, but on all the contributions that she's made to the agency. Please understand that the Texas Lottery is not your typical government agency, it's much more like a Fortune 500 company with billions of dollars flowing through our financial system and having to be accounted for. The uniqueness and complexity of our financial situation here is not for everyone.

To highlight that fact, in the first 13

years of the Texas Lottery, we went through six chief financial officers. In the last almost 17 we've gone through one, and that's Kathy Pyka. That's a testament to Kathy's ability.

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Before Kathy joined our agency in 2005, she had risen through the ranks of state government, serving as Chief Financial Officer first at the Department of Commerce, and then CFO at the Workforce Commission, both in the early and mid-'90s.

In '97, she left the Workforce

Commission with an opportunity with the Texas Railroad

Commission, and that's an agency where Kathy would

spend about the next eight years of her career, rising

from Deputy CFO to CFO to finally Deputy Executive

Director. One of Kathy's longtime colleagues in state

government is our very own Mike Fernandez.

Their paths first crossed back in the mid-'90s when Kathy worked at the Department of Commerce and Mike was with the Workforce Commission.

By 2005, Mike had been working here at the Texas

Lottery long enough to see the challenges that we had in finding and retaining a top-notch CFO. So, when the position became vacant once again, that year Mike came to me and he told me he had an outstanding person that he knew of that might be a great fit for our agency in

his opinion.

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Now, if you know Mike, you also know that Mike has lots of opinions. He's not shy about sharing any. But I value Mike's opinion and I told him go ahead, see if you can get this person to apply for the position. Well, that person of course ended up being Kathy. Kathy went through the interview process for the position which even included one of our Commissioners and our future Chairman Jim Cox who was on the interview panel.

Jim was a wonderful Commissioner and being a CPA, he had a real passion for finance and he wanted to help us find just the right person. So, when the interviews were over, it was clear that Kathy was the standout candidate among all the individuals who had applied and Kathy, thankfully, accepted my offer of employment. And I didn't realize it at the time, but that decision to hire Kathy was surely one of the wisest decisions I've ever made in my working lifetime.

Kathy came on board, she went out and quickly recruited some of her top lieutenants who were at the other agencies, she set about assessing where and how we needed to improve our financial systems and processes and brother, we needed a lot of improvement. And she turned our financial department completely

around.

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Kathy was so good at her job, that we even renamed it. Before Kathy came forward, the job was called the Financial Operations Director. For Kathy, the job title was changed to Controller. Yes, she's that good. Kathy totally redefined the position during her time with the agency. She was lifting our financial competency, our integrity, our reputation, not just in Texas government, but in the entire lottery industry, to all new heights.

Clean financial audits as Commissioner
Franz mentioned, like the one you heard about today and positive internal audit reports. Those became Kathy's trademarks. Whether it was meeting with financial policy experts over at the legislature or working closely with the financial teams, the Multi-State Lottery Association or the North American Lottery Association or evaluating the soundness of publicly traded companies like IGT or Scientific Games, Kathy has always represented the Texas Lottery and the State of Texas in an exemplary fashion.

With Kathy on board, we've never taken a backseat to anyone or any entity on financial matters or negotiations, nor did I ever worry for a moment that I might be outgunned in any high level financial

discussions for meetings.

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Kathy has simply been the best at what she does for the 16 years that she's been here, and that's something that we all wish we could achieve. But as I said in our all staff meeting last week, much more important than her job performance these past many years and something that runs much deeper than normal business relationships, Kathy's been a great friend and a trusted colleague, business partner, and a confidante for me for 16 years. I'm going to miss her tremendously and I know everybody here, her friends, think the exact same way.

So with that, I have a proclamation, I'm going to put you through this, too, Kathy, that I would like to read into the record at this time.

Whereas, Kathy Pyka is retiring from the Texas Lottery Commission; and

Whereas, in fulfilling the duties and tasks of the Controller of the Texas Lottery

Commission, Kathy drew from her extensive experience, having served the State of Texas for more than 35 years through her previous employment with the Texas

Department of Commerce, Workforce Commission, and the Railroad Commission, she is indeed deserving a special professional and personal recognition.

Whereas, for 16 of those years, Kathy served as the Controller for the Texas Lottery

Commission and provided invaluable financial expertise to the Agency; and

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Whereas, during her tenure with the Commission, the Texas Lottery experienced record-breaking sales and revenue transfers to the State of Texas.

Whereas, also during her tenure with the Commission, Kathy has served as an exceptional friend and colleague to the Executive Director and the other Division Directors, and she is regarded by the management team at the Commission as the finest Chief Financial Officer in state government.

Whereas, born on July 31st, 1964, raised in Houston, Texas, Kathy attended Spring Branch High School where she carried on her love of volleyball. She grew up with a large family of three brothers and one sister; Mike, Steve, Donald and Carol. Her parents Viola and Herman were the backbone of the home and Kathy's biggest supporters.

Kathy went on to attend and play volleyball at Saint Edward's University where she obtained her bachelor's in accounting and obtained her CPA. Soon after entering the workforce, she met and

later married her loving husband Greg.

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Whereas, Kathy and Greg are the proud parents of daughter Lauren to whom they provide unconditional love and support and have recently left in the hands of the Baylor Bears, there are many nieces and nephews who are a big part of her life and are loved immensely, as well as their two dogs, Buster and Maggie.

Whereas, Kathy is a dedicated member of St. Martin de Porres Catholic Church in Dripping Springs, having served on the church board of directors for several years; and

Whereas, retirement will provide Kathy with discretionary time to spend with her family traveling to Schulenburg, Fredericksburg, Baylor and beyond, home renovation is also on Kathy's to-do list, a skill that she excels at and enjoys.

Whereas, the Office of the Controller team will greatly miss Kathy's expertise, her drive, her steadfastness, and unwavering support. Her leaving leaves a huge space to be filled, but they are incredibly happy for her.

Whereas, Kathy will also be extremely missed by her friends and other colleagues at the Texas Lottery Commission, be it resolved that the Texas

Lottery Commission and her many friends and loving family members hereby congratulate Kathy on her retirement and extend to her sincere best wishes, now and during this next chapter in her life.

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And be it further resolved, that an official copy of this proclamation has been prepared for Ms. Pyka as an expression of high regard by the Texas Lottery Commission.

I was like ah, this is too great of a job, why would I want to leave now, but you know, at some point in time, you know that there's other things in your life that you want to take up and do, but this was a very difficult decision to make because of the amazing team that I'm part of.

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You know, Mike Fernandez is my very dear friend. I think that y'all know that. In his wisdom, it was 100 percent correct in 2005 when he suggested he thought I might be a good fit for this position. He goes, I think you might really like being part of this team and my gracious, Mike, you were 100 percent correct. It has been an amazing job and amazing group of Directors that I have had the opportunity to work with and their mentorship and their areas of expertise and their support of me in the financial stewardship of this agency has just been outstanding.

So, I'm very blessed and very thankful

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MR. GRIEF: And Mr. Chairman, that concludes my report.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is Bob with the enforcement cases.

MR. BIARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Y'all, I want to add that, you know, I first knew Kathy
my last year at the Railroad Commission, '97-'98 and,
you know, coming here it is so nice to see someone -so encouraging to see someone rise through the ranks in
the state government for 35 years in positions of
responsibility. It's no small feat to survive that
period of time, it's encouraging, in positions of
responsibility, so I just want to add that I admire her
so very much.

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So with that, Item 13 in your notebooks have seven enforcement cases, that's Tabs A through G. And for the record, I'm Bob Biard. There are six Lottery cases and one Bingo Enforcement matter, Tabs A through G.

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In these cases, the Commission staff either found a licensee violated a statute or rule or the Applicant did not qualify for a license. In most of these cases, either the Respondent failed to appear at the hearing and it proceeded by default or the staff and the Respondent reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order, and those are the cases you have today.

Tabs A and B are the non-sufficient fund lottery retailer license revocations handled in a single order. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in the bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account.

In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the Judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

Tabs C through F are lottery agreed orders. Three of these cases involve a retailer buying

1	a winning ticket from a customer and claiming it. And
2	the other case, the retailer had a \$20 minimum purchase
3	requirement when buying tickets with a debit card.
4	The last item is the bingo agreed order,
5	you haven't seen one of those in a while. This case
6	involves a bingo product manufacturer who had multiple
7	violations, including not maintaining a registered
8	agent in the State of Texas. The manufacturer agreed
9	to pay a \$1,000 penalty and is on probation for one
10	year.
11	That concludes my presentation. You may
12	take up these orders in a single vote if you'd like and
13	I'll be happy to answer any questions.
