We'll start 6 with the Pledge of Allegiance. 7 (Pledges recited) 8 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Welcome, 9 everyone. 10 AGENDA ITEM NO. II 11 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: We are going to start 12 with our first item which is the Bingo Advisory 1.3 Committee. And Trace, this is your item. 14 MR. SMITH: Are we good? 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yes. 16 MR. SMITH: Okay. All right. Good 17 morning, chairmen and commissioners. I would like to 18 report the BAC met on December 8th. We discussed the 19 language that we received back from staff regarding the 20 proposed rules about shutter card bingo systems. After 21 review and discussion, the BAC unanimously voted to 22 endorse the rules for the rulemaking process. 23 We also discussed some ideas and 24 improvements for the website, but we will continue to

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work with the staff going forward. I'm available for

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MR. VANCE: Good morning, Mr. Chairman.

Good morning, commissioners. My name is Tyler Vance, I'm Assistant General Counsel. I have for your consideration today proposed new rules for bingo authorizing and regulating shutter cards. These will be rules number 402.331 through 338.

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These rules came about this summer via petition for rulemaking that was submitted by a group of manufacturers represented by Kim Kiplin and Ms. Kiplin is here today and has provided a witness statement if you guys need her. In August, y'all approved the petition and directed staff to draft some rules. Those are the rules that are before you today.

So, we recommend that you propose these rules today so that we can put them out and receive comments from the public. And I'm available for any questions as well.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any questions? Okay. Perfect. So, Kim, would you like to speak?

MS. KIPLIN: Good morning,
commissioners. For the record, my name's Kimberly
Kiplin. I'm an attorney here in Austin, Texas. I do
represent the petitioners in the petition for
rulemaking for the shutter card bingo systems. They're
Texas distributors licensed by the lottery. I also

1	represent a manufacturer of bingo shutter card system.
2	We are just grateful, appreciative, for the opportunity
3	to go through the process to propose the rules for
4	public comment and receive public comment and then move
5	forward in the process.
6	I'm happy to answer any questions that
7	you all have today regarding that process or the rules.
8	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners,
9	any comment? Questions? Okay. Kim, thank you so much
10	for your comments.

ZGABAY-ZGARBA: I'm on item five. 22 23 Item five in your notebook is a presentation of the 24 2022 Biennial Security Study of the Texas Lottery

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Commission. Government Code 466.020 requires the

executive director at least once every two years to employ an independent firm to conduct a comprehensive security study of all aspects of lottery security, stipulating that 12 specific areas must be reviewed. The Act further requires copies of the security study to be provided to the Commission, the Governor and legislature. A copy of the public report is placed in your notebook and will also be placed on the agency's website, and appropriate offices will be notified of its availability.

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The 2022 study was conducted by

BerryDunn. Unfortunately, the representative from

BerryDunn, Christopher Ellingwood, the Senior Manager

of Information Technology and Assurance Services, had a

cancelled flight, which prevented him from being here

this morning to present the study. So, if there are no

objections, I will read his presentation to you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Please. Thank you.

MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: All right. I'm going to put on my Christopher Ellingwood hat.

My name is Christopher Ellingwood. I lead our firm's lottery and gaming group, and have been with the firm for 17 years. I'd like to talk briefly on the process for which we conducted the security study, introduce you to just a little background on the

firm, and present some very high level results of the security study.

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BerryDunn is a national accounting firm and consulting firm headquartered in Portland, Maine. My team and my group specializes in lottery services. On a given year, we are providing approximately 50 audits to state lottery agencies and their vendors, focused on security and internal controls. We also work with lotteries all over the United States, Caribbean, Canada, and Europe.

We have worked with new lotteries and new systems, including digital sportsbook, and we have a wide gamut and view into emerging products throughout the lottery industry. This is our fourth time working with the Texas Lottery on the security study. We've been working in the industry since 1985. I have a dedicated team of about eight people who work full-time in the lottery with me.

We really want to thank Angela Zgabay-Zgarba, Eric Williams and Joan Kotal, for helping us through the security study. A special thank you also goes to Jason Cannaday who coordinated the onsite work and came into the office to work with us. We'd also like to acknowledge Dawn Espinoza and her team at IGT for the help on the vendor side.

This year's security study reflected an agency going through change, a transition to a more remote workforce and the relocation of the lottery headquarters. The majority of work was completed remotely. However, a portion of our testing controls in phase three of the study was completed onsite at the

Texas Lottery's old and new locations.

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This year as always, our security study consists of three phase: a planning phase, a risk phase, and the assessment phase. As I mentioned, this is our fourth year in doing the security study for the Texas Lottery, and we want to comment on the continued success of the investment they have made into information security and the noted strengthening of controls over past years.

We spent our first part of phasing, the planning phase, understanding the new changes that were made, and understanding what was changing as a result of the relocation project, such as the new claims center and draw studio. Because of the move, certain aspects of physical security and past controls were phased out, were not focused on.

We interviewed approximately 25 managers and high level personnel throughout nearly every department of the lottery and we identified 181 risks,

which were based on best practices and current procedures within the lottery. From those 181 risks, and through our meetings, we identified approximately 200 internal controls that were in place throughout the agency to mitigate those risks, and we provided the Texas Lottery with a detailed report that broke down all of the risks and what those results were. This also included an assessment of key vendors, including IGT.

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In the second phase, we came in and tested those 200 controls for operating effectiveness throughout the two-year period since the last security study was performed. We tested this through inspection of documents, sampling interviews, and observation of system configurations. While we were doing this, we were also looking for opportunities for improvement based on our industry experience and best practices as suggested by several governmental frameworks and compliance standards.

As a result of our report, we noted nine findings. The findings would have no impact on the integrity of the lottery games or pose a risk for fraud or a security incident. The findings noted were very much so as a result of changes and working abilities during the pandemic and were low risk administrative

processes that were not completed due to staffing 1 2 constraints. We also provided the lottery with 10 3 best practice recommendations: seven were moderate 4 5 risk, three were low risk. None of the risk or 6 findings would impact the security or integrity of any 7 of the games, systems or products within the Texas Lottery as also noted. 8 A lot of our recommendations and best 9 practices were focused around the efficiency 10 11 improvements, some of the new systems that were put in 12 place, and documentation enhancements. 1.3 This is all I have to present to you. 14 Thank you very much. 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 16 any questions? Comments? Thoughts? Okay. So this is 17 not a voting item, but Angela, great job. And good job 18 on the Chris voiceover as well. 19 MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: So --21 MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: Sorry, I couldn't go 22 into some other voice. 23 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: No, no, no, you did 24 great. Thank you.

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AGENDA ITEM NO. VI

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: All right. Next item, number six, are the 2022 demographic reports on lottery players. Robert, this is your item. Good morning, sir.

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MR. TIRLONI: Good morning. Good morning, Mr. Chairman and commissioners. For the record, I am Robert Tirloni, Lottery Operations

Director. Commissioners, \$466.021 of the State Lottery Act requires that the executive director employ an independent firm to conduct a demographic study of Texas Lottery players every two years. The results of the study must be presented to the Commission, the Governor, and the legislature, before the convening of each regular legislative session.

Item six in your notebook is the 2022 demographic study. I'm very happy to have Dr. Gail Buttorff, Associate Director for the Center for Public Policy, Hobby School of Public Affairs at the University of Houston with us today, and she is going to present to you the high level results of the most recent demographic study. And with that, I will turn it over to Dr. Buttorff.

DR. BUTTORFF: Thank you. Good morning. We're just going to wait on the presentation here.

Okay. My name is Gail Buttorff, and as Robert said,

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You can go to the next slide, please. Next slide.

Okay. So this year we had a total sample for the demographic survey of 1,685 respondents, and this year we did an entirely web-based sampling, which was different than previous years. This results in an approximate confidence interval or margin of error of plus or minus 2.4 percent.

Next slide. And next slide, please.

Okay. Overall among our survey respondents, we found a participation rate of 61.6 percent, which was about 16 percentage points higher than in 2020, and this was statistically significant.

In terms of demographic differences between players and non-players, we found statistically significant results for employment status, marital status, having children under 18 living in the household, gender, Hispanic origin, education and occupation.

In terms of median dollars spent, we had a total of 33 dollars in 2022 compared to 36 in 2020 and 25 in 2018.

1 Next slide, please.

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The top three sales districts by participation rates were San Antonio with 71.6 percent participation, McAllen 71.4 percent, Waco 64.9 percent.

In terms of the highest average expenditures per month and the highest median expenditures per month, these were both in San Antonio with 65.58 for the average and 40 for the median.

Next slide, please. And next slide. Thank you.

Okay. In terms of the games, the top five games by participation rates were Lotto Texas with 81.8 percent participation among our respondents, the Texas Lottery scratch games with participation of 69.2 percent, Mega Millions at 64.4, Pick 3 61.4, and finally Powerball with a participation rate of 50.8 percent.

The highest average expenditure per play was found for All or Nothing at \$22.24 cents per play.

And the highest average number of times played were for Daily 4. Okay, both in terms of times per week and times per month.

Next slide, please.

In terms of the average number of times played weekly and monthly compared to 2020, we saw

We had mixed results for Lotto Texas, Mega Millions, Powerball, Pick 3, Cash 5, Megaplier, Power Play Extra! feature with Lotto Texas, Fireball feature with Pick 3, Texas, Two Step, All or Nothing and Daily 4.

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In terms of average dollars spent per play compared to 2020, we saw increases in Lotto Texas, scratch games, Mega Millions, Pick 3, Cash 5, All or Nothing, Fireball feature with Daily 4. And we found stable or decreases for Powerball, Megaplier, Power Play, Extra! feature with Lotto Texas, Fireball feature with Pick 3 and Texas Two Step, and finally, Daily 4.

Next slide, please. And next slide.

All right. This slide shows you the participation rates over the past almost 20 years, from 1993 to 2022. And you can see that we see the increase which was mentioned previously of over the 2020 and 2018 participation rates.

Next slide, please.

And this table one from the demographic survey report shows key findings in terms of participation rate, changes in rates from 2020. So, for example, you can see that Mega Millions had the highest increase or highest percentage increase with

7.6 percent increase over 2020, whereas Daily 4 had the biggest decrease in percentage change with 1.4 percent decrease over 2020.

And in terms of average, the average spent per play, we saw the largest for All or Nothing with \$22, and the lowest for Megaplier feature with Mega Millions at \$12.59.

Okay. And next slide.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any questions?

(No response)

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: So, I know this is something you do every couple of years. Is it becoming easier, harder? Are there any challenges, anything that we can do at the lottery to assist with your findings?

DR. BUTTORFF: Well, in terms of surveying, one of the reasons we recommended moving to all online was because it's easier and far more costeffective to survey online than over the phone. And Texas and in general, it's hard to survey. It's very hard and it's very expensive to survey over the phone, and this is either landlines or cell phones. It's

incredibly costly and time consuming all over the 1 2 country, but in particular, Texas has been difficult to 3 get participants over the phone. And so that's where we have recommended and the Lottery Commission has 4 agreed to move the survey online, which is usually done 5 6 in about two weeks time, right, for far less money. 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 8 any final thoughts? Okay. We very much appreciate 9 your coming to present. And Gail, thank you. 10 Okay. Robert, good job. 11 MR. TIRLONI: Thank you, sir. 12 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Even though it wasn't 13 you presenting or you didn't have to do any voiceover, 14 but still a good job in the coordination --1.5 MR. TIRLONI: Thank you. I appreciate 16 that. 17 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: -- of Gail. So thank 18 you. 19 AGENDA ITEM NO. VII 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is 21 number seven, lottery sales and revenue. Kelly and 22 Robert, your item. 23 MS. STUCKEY: And good morning, 24 commissioners. Again, Kelly Stuckey, Controller for 25 the agency. And obviously with me this morning, Robert

and I will be presenting an update on sales through the week ending December 3rd, 2022.

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So beginning on that second slide, we'll be looking at comparative total sales presented there at the bottom. And it's here we note that through this 14-week period, total sales for fiscal year '23 are \$2,232,000,000. And that's an increase of 165-million, or 8 percent, over the \$2,058,000,000 we had in fiscal year '22 at the same time.

Then looking at scratch sales specifically, reflected there on that second orange bar on the right, our sales are \$1,673,000,000 and that is unfortunately showing a 1.7-million decrease from our fiscal year '22 sales.

Our scratch ticket growth rate right now is a slight decrease of .1 percent over last fiscal year. And then also, our scratch ticket sales are currently making up 75.3 percent of our total sales. Little unusual, we usually hang around that low 80s. For instance, last year, fiscal year '22 was 81.4 at this time.

Then I'm sure you remember last end of October, early November, we had that Powerball run up to \$1.9-billion and we had been seeing scratch ticket sales week-over-week increase with the highest being

5.8 percent that last week of that large jackpot.

However, these last three weeks, we've been seeing a decline in scratch sales with this most December 3rd week as high as 3.9 percent decline. So, Robert will go over that a little more in detail on his part of the presentation.

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And then moving into draw sales, our fiscal year '23 draw sales on that second blue bar, are 549.9-million, and that is 166.8-million or 44 percent increase over our fiscal year '22 draw sales. Last year we were running 383.1-million.

And so now I'll turn it over to Robert to go over the overview sales by game.

MR. TIRLONI: Thank you, Kelly. Good morning again, commissioners.

So if we look at this slide at the bottom right corner, you can see the year-over-year gain of \$165-million. The overwhelming majority of that is coming from the jackpot portion of the portfolio, which is up at the top of the slide in white.

Obviously, this is from the advertised

1.9-billion jackpot for the Powerball game that
occurred in early November. That is the new world
record. The previous world record was 1.6-billion and

that was also Powerball jackpot back in 2016. So you can see Powerball is up over \$121-million and its add-on game Power Play is up almost \$22-million.

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Mega Millions did have a good run. A couple of months ago it got up to almost \$500-million, and actually, for tomorrow night it's \$400-million. So, it's been doing well. It is up almost \$20-million and its add-on games are up as well.

Lotto is holding even, which is great news. The Extra! feature on Lotto is up; that continues to gain in popularity, and Texas Two Step is up slightly, too. So, great results from the jackpot portion of the portfolio.

In the middle of the slide in blue are the daily games. What we're seeing is what we have been seeing. All or Nothing is up 2-million, which is great, Cash 5 is holding, Daily 4 is up slightly, and we continue to see Pick 3 decline. So if you look at the daily games as a whole, they're down just about 1.3-million. So, the draw game portion of the portfolio is up almost \$167-million. So, great news for draw games.

Scratch tickets are down 1.7-million as Kelly mentioned. Before we leave this slide, I thought I would just make a couple of comments about the \$165-

million gain and where we're at at this point in time. So we're through our first quarter of our fiscal year. While that 165-million is a great solid start and we're really happy with that, we have seen some weakness in scratch sales over the past few weeks. We've made some adjustments to our game plan and we'll see if we see an impact from those changes in the next three to four weeks.

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I think it's worth noting that at the very end of last fiscal year in July, we had a very, very large Mega Millions jackpot. It was \$1.28-billion. So, we're going to have some very, very tough weeks at the end of this current fiscal year. Those comparison weeks are going to be very tough if we don't have large jackpots at the end of this fiscal year.

So last year, our total sales were 8.3-billion. Scratch sales were 6.7-billion. So, we realize that we have a very large mountain to climb this year to compete with last year's sales and so we've got some challenges ahead and we'll continue to keep you updated in these meetings as we move forward.

I did have another note. I've given you sample tickets. So, you have all of our holiday tickets. Those are up there. And then you have a multiplier family that's called the Cash Blitz. The

Cash Blitz is starting in January. That's a game from IGT Printing, and they partnered with iHeartRadio. And as part of that partnership, we are going to be receiving a very good marketing support package to help support that family. So, we have high hopes that we will see some really good sales when that family starts in early January.

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And last but not least, Lauren Callahan, our Media Relations Director, is here today and she wants to give you an update on an award the agency just won.

MS. CALLAHAN: Robert, thank you. Mr. Chairman and commissioners, good morning. For the record, my name is Lauren Callahan, Media Relations Division Director for the agency.

I am pleased to update you today on yet another accolade the agency has received as a result of the 30th anniversary committee's work. When I appeared before you at the June meeting, I shared that the 30th anniversary documentary entitled 30 Years of Winning, had been awarded a Telly Award, the world's largest honor for video and television content across all screens. But as it turns out, that's not all.

At the World Lottery Summit in Vancouver on October 19th, 30 Years of Winning won a Batchy Award

in the special category for corporate and beneficiary 1 2 This is a great honor in and of itself, but to 3 top it off, the film was also recognized by our lottery peers across North America as this year's Best of the 4 5 Batch; the very best entry submitted in any category, 6 including all television, all radio, all advertising, 7 and all corporate communications entries, by all of the North American lotteries. This is the very first time 8 9 a Texas lottery entry has won Best of the Batch. 10 We wanted to take a moment this morning 11 to show you what the audience in Vancouver saw as the 12 Best of the Batch award was announced. So at this 1.3 time, I'm going to ask Phillip to roll the video. 14 (Video played as follows:) 1.5 VIDEO ANNOUNCER: The 2022 Best of the 16 Batch is the Texas Lottery for their 30 Years of 17 Winning 30th anniversary documentary. 18 (Video concluded) 19 We appreciate your MS. CALLAHAN: Hmm. 20 patience as we are still learning the AV systems in 21 this room ourselves. So we'll give this one more try. 22 COMMISSIONER STEEN: Just increasing the

When I think back to lottery startup, I was a year and a half into my career working at the state

Comptroller's office.

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NELDA TREVIÑO (Speaking in Video): You know, being a staff member at the Comptroller's office 30 years ago, and after the legislation was enacted and before the constitutional amendment passed, the controller at the time, John Sharp, formed a startup task force.

NORA LINARES-MOELLER (Speaking in Video): And around that time, as the session was going on, John said to me, I need for you to start -- to go and pull 10 people. You're going to have a regular job at the Comptroller's office, but I'm going to give you 10 people from the Comptroller's office, different functions, and go and do some research on lotteries. So, we did. And Nelda was one of those people, Gary Grief was another one of those people, and we decided that we needed to kind of go out into the country and figure out what the lotteries did, what we wanted, what we didn't want. And so we did that.

We came up with a questionnaire. Everyone took a different state that were running

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LETICIA VAN DE PUTTE (Speaking in Video): It was very close. And Governor Richards had worked and worked the phones and personal visits and her charm and personality won over so many members.

NORA LINARES-MOELLER (speaking in video): The constitutional amendment passed, I think by about 60-something percent.

So that's it, we were going to have a lottery.

GARY GRIEF (speaking in video): We had a mandate of when to start. We had to start before May of 1992 and trying to see in the future and see all the things come together that had to do that was very daunting.

TIA PAIR (Speaking in Video): The night before ticket sales started, we were at a big event center and so we did the kickoff for the lottery, handed out free tickets and merchandise and that sort of thing, so -- so it was amazing to be part of. And we were there late that night and the next morning they had us there at 5:30 in the morning because they were afraid if tickets still go on, somebody's going to want to claim.

ED ROGERS (Speaking in Video): It was really clear from the response from the business owners around the state how extremely interested they were and how excited they were to have this new product in their stores, but also the players calling in. It was the same thing; it was just this crazy level of excitement and interest in, you know, what was coming next.

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AURA ANDRADE (Speaking in Video): When winners came in, there was news coverage about the winners. We actually rolled out a red carpet for the winners.

ROBERT TIRLONI (Speaking in Video): We had people show up with their entire family. You know, 20 or 30 people would show up. It was a celebration and people were excited. And back at that time, you know, we didn't have social media, so I think people were really okay with having their 15 minutes of fame, whether that be on TV or in a newspaper story. And they were cool with doing that.

MARY ANN WILLIAMSON (Speaking in Video):

For me, I think the most memorable moment was having
the opportunity to put Gary Grief in as Executive

Director. I think for a successful business, it's all
about what sort of culture you create. I could see
that he would be able to create one that would just

take the lottery up to the next step.

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RYAN MINDELL (Speaking in Video): You don't have the success that we've had in over the last 10, 15 years without constantly innovating and pushing ourselves forward. If I look at the past few years and even things that we're doing differently from three years ago or five years ago, we're already finding ways to do them better and to do them more interestingly and do them more efficiently.

BOB BIARD (Speaking in Video): It's a real tension because it's a box that we're in. So to be able to fulfill the functions of a Fortune 500 level company within the confines of a Texas state agency, I mean, it's a challenge and it's also a pleasure.

ROBERT TIRLONI (Speaking in Video): You know, we sell tickets for almost 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. There's a lot that goes into making sure that that all goes smoothly and that there's product at almost 20,000 retailers across the state.

JOE LAPINSKI (Speaking in Video): Texas has had to take that narrow product line of draw games and scratch tickets, and really work to innovate within those product lines. And so I think necessity has really driven innovation here in -- in a way that

really sets them apart in the industry.

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GARY GRIEF (Speaking in Video): What we put together here, and this is what I take the most pride in, are people who find a way to get to the other side of whatever that initiative for that project is, no matter what it is.

(Video concluded)

MS. CALLAHAN: We knew when we finished the documentary that it is a special film that tells our unique story.

As we filmed, I was struck how the same theme came across from every single participant; what an incredible team works here and through hard work, innovation and perseverance, the Texas Lottery's sales records year-over-year have led to record revenue returns to Texas public education and veterans.

What we do here at the Texas Lottery is truly remarkable for a state agency. It is, however, immensely rewarding to be recognized by these outside entities and especially by our lottery peers across the North American continent for sharing the Texas Lottery's unique story of our mission, business model, and employee culture.

None of these awards were possible without the work of all the 30th anniversary committee

1	members, but specifically those who joined me in
2	working on the documentary subcommittee: Philip Bates,
3	Stephen Cruz, Steve Helm, Andrew Leeper, Roger Prather,

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So, total transfers to the State have amounted to 279.4-million for the first two months of fiscal year '23, and of that amount, 274.8-million was transferred to the Foundation School Fund and 4.6-million was transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission.

So that gives us a 2.9 percent increase, or 7.6-million, over the transfer to the Foundation School Fund for the same time last year. And then cumulative to date to the Foundation School Fund are 29.9-billion, and cumulative transfers to the State are 35.9-billion.

Texas lottery commission 12/12/2022 transcript Verbatim Reporting & Transcription LLC (281) 724-8600 The 88th Legislature will convene its regular session next month on January the 10th.

Pre-filing of legislation began on November the 14th, and we've begun our process of tracking legislation of interest to the agency.

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In addition to legislation that may be filed related to the administration of the lottery or the regulation of charitable bingo, other legislation that the agency tracks covers a variety of subjects.

These measures could relate to subjects regarding other gaming activities, open meetings of governmental bodies, open records in the Public Information Act, state purchasing and contracting, and matters related to the state budget and state employees.

Today, I want to highlight a few bills that have been pre-filed related to both charitable bingo and the lottery. These include House Bill 431 by Representative Senfronia Thompson. Again, relating to the conduct of Charitable Bingo.

This legislation is similar to the bill that Representative Thompson filed last session. In addition to the bill, including several statutory cleanup language and provisions that the agency requested, the legislation also repeals the 750,000 -- excuse me, the 750 prize limit per game.

Let me repeat that. The bill also repeals the \$750 prize limit and increases the bingo occasion prize cap from \$205,000 (sic) to \$5,000. The bill also increases the number of temporary licenses a regular license holder can hold from 24 to 48, and it also changes the negative net proceeds evaluation period from one year to two years.

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Another bill that's been filed related to charitable bingo is House Bill 639. This was filed by Representative Jose Lozano. This relates to the number of temporary licenses issued to conduct bingo to non-regular license holders in a calendar year. The legislation increases the number of temporary licenses a non-regular license holder may request from six to 12.

A bill related to the lottery that's been filed, House Bill 903 by representative Joe Moody. This relates to the operation of a quick draw lottery game.

This bill allows the sale of a quick draw lottery game, commonly known as a keno game in the lottery industry, at bars and restaurant.

Lastly, it's anticipated that the proposed General Appropriations Act, commonly known as the state budget, will be filed soon. We'll be keeping

1	a watchful eye to see the funding that's been proposed
2	for the Lottery Commission. We'll certainly keep you
3	posted on the budget process throughout the legislative
4	session.

were not tampered with during the move from the old facility to the new drawing studio. We also focused on game drawing processes and physical security of the new facilities.

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We noted that TLC took strong measures to ensure that all game equipment and the ball sets were secured during the entire packing, move, and set up process. And that's really important for reputation and ensuring integrity.

When it comes to the drawing game processes in the new studio, the agency continues to deploy best practices and the lottery -- the studio itself is equipped with state-of-the-art technology. All game drawings are closely monitored and strict protocols are in place.

It's important to note that the lottery moved their operations from a building which they were the only tenants, and had full control over the physical security and infrastructure. However, their new location is a state-owned building that's still under construction at the time of the audit. It has several state agencies as tenants and is managed by the Texas Facilities Commission. Because of this, there are many impacts to the draw studio operations, which includes mission critical stability of internet and

power to ensure game drawings are conducted on time.

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When the last Mega drawings was delayed, my first thought when called was it wasn't Texas

Lottery, was it, because I knew we had some issues with the internet, and fortunately, it was not the Texas

Lottery that held up that drawing.

We rated the agency's processes in place for the move and game drawings as best practices. The one finding we had is that the Facilities Commission has not granted TLC access to generate badge access reports, nor did they provide the reports to the lottery on a timely basis.

This is a crucial control to ensure that only authorized individuals have entered the drawing studio and other sensitive areas. The lottery operates the drawing studio seven days a week, morning, afternoons and evenings. Therefore, they do not have the luxury of waiting for the Facilities Commission to respond to a request for an access report if they suspect an unauthorized individual has entered the drawing studio or other sensitive areas of operations. We recommended that the Facilities Commission grant access to the Lottery Commission to generate their own access reports on demand.

That concludes the report on drawing

studio. 1 2 I wanted to let you know that we are 3 wrapping up an audit of where we looked at the physical security and operational impact as the result of moving 4 to the new building, and we will have a summary for 5 6 that at the next commission meeting. 7 That's all I have for you today, but I'm 8 happy to address any questions you may have. 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. In these cases, the Commission staff found the licensee violated a lottery or bingo statute or rule. And in many cases, either the respondent fails to appear at the hearing and it proceeds by default, or the staff and the respondent reach a settlement in the form of an agreed order. And those are the type of cases we have today.

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Tabs A through C are the non-sufficient fund lottery retailer license revocations. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover transfers to the Commission's account.

In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

Tabs D and E are lottery agreed orders.

One of these is a case where a retailer purchased a ticket from a customer to claim, and the other is a case where the retailer charged a fee for purchasing lottery tickets with a debit card.

Tab F is a bingo agreed order, and this is a repeat licensee, a bingo manufacturer who was the subject of an agreed order earlier this year for various violations of the Bingo Enabling Act. He

1	failed to comply with the prior order and has agreed to
2	pay a \$5,000 penalty.
3	And that concludes my presentation. You
