There we go. 1.3 I'm Kelly Stuckey, Controller for the 14 agency, and with me this morning is Robert Tirloni, our 15 Lottery Operations Director, and we'll be providing an 16 update on sales through last week or week ending June 17 17th, 2023. 18 So, looking at this first slide here, 19 we'll see that through this 42-week period total sales there at the bottom of the slide for fiscal year '23 20 21 are \$6,914,000,000. That's an increase of over 366-22 million or 5.6 percent over the last year's fiscal year 23 '22 sales at this same time, which were 6,548,000,000. 24 Then looking at the scratch ticket

sales, those are reflected in the orange bars there.

Fiscal year '23, we have sales of \$5,420,000,000, and so that is a 24.1-million or just .4 percent increase over our fiscal year '22 sales.

So, due to our strong draw sales this year, our scratch sales are making up 78.4 percent of our total sales. Compared to last year, we were at 82.4 percent of scratch compared to draw this year.

So, then moving on to the blue bars, our draw sales. Fiscal year '23 draw sales are 1,494,000,000 and that is a \$342-million increase, or 29.7 percent, over last year. Last year at this time we had 1,152,000,000 in draw sales.

And so now I'll turn it over to Robert to discuss by game.

MR. TIRLONI: Thanks, Kelly. Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning, Commissioners. There's the slide. Okay.

So, this is our sales results through last Saturday, June 17th. This is all good news. Our draw games are up almost 342-million. You can see that on the orange line. The bulk of that gain is coming from the jackpot portion of the portfolio.

We've talked a lot about this over the past year, but we've had a very successful year in terms of jackpots across all of the jackpot games. The

only thing that's really changed since we were last together was the roll on our Lotto Texas game. That jackpot climbed up to \$95-million. That was for the Saturday, April 22nd draw. And that was the third highest advertised jackpot in the history of that game. So, it's the first draw game we ever launched back in November of '92. So, you know its 31-year history. So, that was an impressive jackpot size for Lotto Texas.

You can obviously see the \$63-million gain we're experiencing this year compared to last.

And even the add-on feature Lotto Extra is up \$11-million. So, great results there.

Again, the whole rest of the jackpot portfolio is up because of the Powerball and Mega Millions jackpots we've been talking about this fiscal year.

The blue font, excuse me, in the middle of the slide are our daily games. The only game that's down is Pick 3, it's down a little bit over 5-million. The other games in that portion of the portfolio are making up for that difference. And the daily games are up \$1.1-million. Again, that's what gives us our draw games total of a gain of almost 342-million.

Scratch is up \$24-million. It's

currently at \$5.4-billion in sales this fiscal. And if we sum all of this up, we have a gain of \$366-million.

I've mentioned this before. We're getting closer to this time period, though at the end of July, we'll have really tough comparison weeks compared to this time last year because we had a \$1.2-billion Mega Millions jackpot at the end of July. So we'll see what plays out over the next 8 to 10 weeks with our jackpots and see how those weeks compare.

Like I said, we're going to have some tough comparison weeks, so either in August or when we do our end-of-the-year report in October, you know, that draw games surplus we expect it to be a little bit less than what we're seeing now.

Last thing I have for you today in closing is just a note. IGT Texas is currently monitoring very closely the potential UPS strike. IGT uses UPS to ship all of our scratch tickets to over 18,000 plus lottery locations. So, there's a potential strike right at the beginning of August and they're putting plans in place and we're working closely with them to beef up inventory levels in the field at retailer locations in the month of July, just in case that strike does happen. So, I just want to let you know about that before we get into our next meeting in

August. 1 2 And that's our sales report for today. 3 We'd be happy to answer any questions you might have. 4 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 5 any questions, comments? 6 MR. TIRLONI: Thank you so much. 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Great job. AGENDA ITEM NO. VIII 8 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is a report 10 on transfers to the state. Kelly, this is also your 11 item. 12 MS. STUCKEY: Yes, sir. Commissioners, 1.3 the report in your notebook for this item is the 14 agency's accrued revenue transfers through April 30th, 1.5 2023, and that reflects a 1.39-billion transfer to the 16 State through the end of April. However, we did just 17 last week wrap up our May transfer, so I wanted to go 18 ahead and give you those updated numbers. 19 So, for this nine-month period, we've 20 transferred \$1,586,000,000, 1.5 of that has gone to the 21 Foundation School Fund, 20.2-million to the Texas

So, for the Foundation School Fund, this is a 10.7 percent increase over last year or 145.4-

million came from unclaimed prizes.

the House had approved as it relates to the funding for the regulation of bingo;

The lottery's annual advertising budget being maintained at \$10-million; and

A rider provision originally adopted by the Senate and with the intent of directing the agency to prohibit the activity of third-party lottery courier services operating in the state was included in Article IX of the appropriations bill.

The rider language in Section 17.36 states, and I quote, "The Executive Director of the Texas Lottery Commission shall not allow the order, purchase, or sale of lottery tickets by telephone, including facilitating the sale of tickets via an application on a phone," end quote.

The Governor signed the appropriations bill on June the 18th and issued a proclamation related to House Bill 1. Included in the proclamation is a statement related to the rider provision, which state's, and I quote, "I must note that Section 17.36 of Article IX is unconstitutional. Section 17.36 purports to tell the Lottery Commission that it must issue a new rule on a particular subject. This attempt to make general law in the General Appropriations Act violates Article III, Section 35 of the Texas

Constitution. A similar command to the Lottery

Commission was proposed in Senate Bill No. 1820, but
the Legislature did not pass that bill," end quote.

The appropriations bill also includes an approved 5 percent increase to state employees' salaries in fiscal year 2024, followed by another 5 percent increase in fiscal year 2025. The supplemental appropriations bill, Senate Bill 30, provides funding to allow the first 5 percent increase to begin next month, and the second 5 percent salary increase will occur on September the 1st 2024.

A few other updates on some additional bills that were also enacted. One that our Bingo Advisory Committee Chairman Trace Smith, already referred to, Senate Bill 643 by Senator Judith Zaffirini, again relating to the conduct of bingo. And to summarize, this legislation repeals the \$750 prize limit per game. It increases the bingo occasion prize limit cap from 2,500 to \$5,000. It increases the number of temporary licenses a regular license holder may request from 24 to 48. It changes the negative net proceeds evaluation period from one year to two, and it includes several statutory cleanup and clarifying provisions requested by the agency.

Additionally, House Bill 639 by

Representative Jose Lozano was also enacted. This legislation increases the number of temporary licenses a non-regular license holder may request in the calendar year from six to 12.

Additionally, House Bill 1620 by representative Justin Holland and Senate Bill 1659 by Senator Charles Schwertner, are two separate bills that relate to the Sunset Commission's review schedule of state agencies. While consideration was given to move the Lottery Commission sunset date, with the final provision included in House Bill 1620, the agency's sunset date remains at 2025 and the agency sunset review process will occur during this upcoming cycle.

The agency's legislative implementation project is now in progress and the review of enacted legislation is occurring to identify implementation actions that will be required by the agency.

Lastly, and for the record, Chairman Rivera's gubernatorial reappointment to the Commission for a term to expire in February 2027 was unanimously confirmed by the Senate. Congratulations, Mr. Chairman.

This concludes my report and at this time I'm going to turn it over to Gary and Bob for some additional comments.

You heard in Nelda's report this morning information regarding the rider that was placed in Article IX regarding lottery couriers, and you also heard about the recent proclamation that was issued by the Governor regarding the constitutionality of that rider. Further to the lottery courier matter, and as you are aware, there was much discussion during the legislative session by members of the legislature, by members of the media, and others, regarding the Commission's position regarding lottery couriers. There were also discussions regarding the agency's authority over lottery courier activities, as well as statements that were made about the rulemaking actions taken in the past by this Commission.

I believe it's important that we make a very clear record regarding the agency's position regarding couriers, as well as address any potential misinformation that may be out there in the public domain regarding this Commission's rulemaking history insofar as it does or does not relate to courier activities.

So I've asked our General Counsel Bob Biard to provide a report to you today on this matter.

At the April commission meeting, I said that the Commission's limited jurisdiction under the State Lottery Act doesn't include the activities of third-party courier services. And I want to add that last session, the Senate Research Center, which provides objective research and information to the Texas Senate, in its analysis of the committee substitute to SB 1820 confirmed this view.

In its analysis of SB 1820, the Senate Research Center said that, quote, "Third-party couriers are not comprehended in current law."

Now, during the agency's appearance before the Senate Finance Committee and when SB 1820 was considered by the Senate State Affairs Committee, some erroneous public statements were made during these legislative hearings that the Lottery Commission improperly amended its rules in 2015 and 2020 to allow courier transactions to occur. And some similar statements about the Commission rules were made during the Senate floor discussion on the appropriations bill.

As Gary mentioned, we want to take this opportunity to make a clear record and address any

misinformation in a public setting. To be very clear, from the Commission's understanding of how courier services work, the Commission's rules, including the 2015 and 2020 changes, do not in any way authorize or condone lottery ticket courier services in Texas.

The 2015 rule amendments provided players with two additional ways to provide their draw ticket game numbers to a licensed brick and mortar retailer. The first was using a previously generated draw game ticket, and that was for players who were using the same numbers, and the second was generating a QR code of their numbers using the official Texas Lottery Mobile app, which allowed the licensed lottery retailer to scan the code to get those numbers.

The Commission at that time addressed potential concerns regarding generation of a QR code on the Texas Lottery app in the rule preamble and clarified there would be no ability for players to purchase lottery tickets or play lottery games on a mobile device or the internet. And the public discussion prior to the vote to publish the proposed amendments at the May 28th, 2015 Commission meeting expressly addressed this issue.

The Lottery Operations Director at that time stated in response to questions from Commissioner

Lowe, quote, "There will be no sales taking place via the mobile application. The sales transaction is exactly the same as it is today. The player has to interact with the retailer or one of our retail sales devices...in order to conduct the sales transaction to purchase their tickets. So that's not a change. It's really just the difference between providing a paper play slip or presenting their phone with the QR code that will allow them to submit their play selections to the retailer."

So that was the 2015 rule changes.

The 2020 rule amendments made no change to the prohibition on selling tickets by phone. And that prohibition still appears three places in the Commission's rules.

The amendments in 2020 were non-substantive and did not change the requirement that all lottery tickets must be purchased in person at a brick-and-mortar licensed lottery location.

The term, quote, "Present at the terminal" was formerly a definition in the rules, but it only appeared one other place to address customer service requirements and it was deleted because those requirements were already adequately addressed. The only place this term appeared was in the general draw

game rule at 401.304(b)(1), which, following those amendments, is now 401.304(b)(2), and that addressed -- that section addresses a retailer's customer service obligations.

The rule said and still says today, quote, "Retailers must give prompt service to lottery customers present and waiting at the terminal to purchase tickets for draw games." So that change had nothing to do with the location of the sales transaction.

The deletion of similar language in the following section of that same rule was also non-substantive and redundant of existing rule language that clearly requires the sales transaction to take place entirely at the retail location. Today, that rule, which is 401.304(b)(3), continues to state, and I'm quoting here, "Draw game tickets shall be sold only at the location listed on each retailer's license from the commission. For purposes of this section, the sale of a draw game lottery ticket at the license location means a lottery transaction in which all elements of the sale between the retailer and the purchaser must take place at the retailer location using their terminal, including the exchange of consideration, the exchange of the playslip if one is used, and the

exchange of the draw game ticket."

So in closing, and to emphasize two points once again, first, the Commission's limited jurisdiction under the State Lottery Act does not include the activities of third-party courier services. And second, the Commission's rules, including the 2015 and 2020 changes, do not in any way authorize or condone lottery ticket courier services in Texas.

Commissioners, thank you, and that concludes my report.

As a brief refresher, the Sunset process in Texas state government works by setting a date on which an agency is abolished unless the legislature passes a bill to continue it. Sunset staff evaluate the agency and issue recommendations for change.

The Sunset Advisory Commission, which consists of five senators, five representatives, and two public members, considers the recommendations of the Sunset staff, hears testimony and decides on a package of changes to bring to the full legislature.

For timing, the first step will be a self-evaluation report prepared by the agency. That is due to Sunset staff by September 1st, so just in a couple of months. After we submit our self-evaluation report, Sunset staff will be reviewing the agency over the next year.

The Sunset Advisory Commission must complete its recommendations by January 2025. Those recommendations will be considered by the full legislature in the 89th legislative session. So, this is just a high-level overview of the process, and it's just begun. I will continue to keep you updated as we go through the process. And that concludes my presentation.

The Sunset Commission requires a policy like this for all state agencies as an across the board recommendation. The Commission first adopted this policy in December 2013 and approved revisions in July 2016, December 2018, and June 2021. It's time again to review and approve the policy.

We recommend no changes to the document in your notebooks other than the new effective date.

We recommend that the Commission re-adopt policy P-002 effective today, June 21st, 2023. Happy to answer any

We also completed the quarterly network access testing and found no issues with individuals that have access, and you do not have anybody that does — that should not have access to your system either, so, good job everybody.

We're wrapping up key vendor SOC user control audit, and we just started the jackpot estimation system audit.

Over the next month, we will begin our annual risk assessment and preparing our audit plan for fiscal year 2024 and we will bring that back to you at the next Commission meeting for approval.

Lastly, we've been closely monitoring the Texas Facilities Commission's implementation of the eight recommendations we made to address weaknesses we identified in the security and infrastructure of the new facilities. Association elections held this year, I was approached and asked to seek the position of MUSL chair of the Mega Millions game group, meaning I will be MUSL, the Multi-State Lottery Association's representative and liaison to the Mega Millions Consortium, which is a group of states that Texas is not a member of, but we obviously do sell the Mega Millions game.

I considered that request, and ultimately I said yes, and I was subsequently elected to that position last week. This will be an important role because in the immediate future going forward, the Mega Millions Consortium is looking at the current performance of the Mega Millions game and considering whether the time may be right to consider making changes to that game.

Having had experience over the years making several game changes to both Mega Millions and Powerball, I'll be working closely with the Mega

Millions Consortium to ensure that the interests of the 1 2 38 states in MUSL, are appropriately represented in 3 those meetings. Item 15 contains 13 lottery cases and two bingo cases, tabs A through O. In these cases, Commission staff found a licensee violated a lottery or bingo statute or rule. And in most of these cases, either the Respondent failed to appear at the hearing and it proceeds by defaults, or the staff and the Respondent reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order.

We have both of these types of cases today, as well as several cases that were litigated at the State Office of Administrative Hearings.

And I do want to note that with tabs A through O, we have the final order O was put in your notebooks as a litigated matter, and that case has

reached a settlement. So, O is being presented to you today for approval of an agreed order between the bingo unit and the Commission staff. O was a matter that was considered at the State Office of Administrative hearings along with Tab N.

Tab N remains a litigated matter and we have two people who have signed up asking to speak to the Commission, Mr. Steve Fenoglio and Kris Keller. So, if you like, I'll run through everything except for Tab N, and if you want to go ahead and dispose of those, you can. And then we can have the commenters step up.

Tabs A through F are the non-sufficient fund cases. Each case was presented at the State

Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account.

In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

Tabs G through I are lottery agreed orders and they're in your notebook.

 $\hbox{Tabs J through M are lottery cases that} \\ \hbox{went to hearing at SOAH.} \ \ \, \hbox{Two of these are} \\$

non-sufficient fund cases, like the kind that you would normally approve all in a single order. But the retailers protested and they went to SOAH for a hearing and the judge recommended revocation in both cases.

And the other two were default cases against a retailer. One was a debit card charge case, our Commission investigator was charged an additional charge for trying to purchase lottery tickets with a debit card. And the other one of those cases was a case where a retailer purchased a winning ticket from a customer to claim as their own.

And as I mentioned earlier, N and O are bingo litigated cases, they were heard together. They involve a common set of facts. Tab N was a case involving the bingo worker Monica Weber. Tab O was the bingo unit that had hired Ms. Weber to do work for them.

The unit case has settled. It's now an agreed order. I can discuss that more if you'd like. I provided that to each of you individually as soon as it was signed, and it is ready to be approved now, so if you'd like, you can go ahead and approve Tabs A through M and O and then we'll have public comment.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Is there a motion for approval?

COMMISSIONER FRANZ: I'll move that we 1 2 approve as laid out by Bob. 3 COMMISSIONER SAENZ: I second. CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. All in favor 4 5 say aye. 6 (Chorus of "Ayes") 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Motion passes. 8 MR. BIARD: Thank you. And now Mr. 9 Fenoglio, I believe, would like to speak on Monica 10 Weber's case. 11 MR. He didn't respond to discovery requests. We lawyers have a procedure called a request for disclosure. Counsel for the Commission employed it and said, identify your witnesses. Unfortunately, Ms. Weber's counsel didn't identify any witness, and when that person tried to call a witness, Mr. Kris Keller, counsel for the Commission appropriately objected, said he hasn't been identified and moved to prohibit him from testifying. The ALJ, Administrative Law Judge, properly granted that motion, so Mr. Keller's testimony would be directly relevant to the proceeding in this matter, but because of inadequate counsel, Mr. Keller could not testify. Counsel for Ms. Weber at the time didn't even identify Ms. Weber as a witness.

I've been practicing law since '85,

first four years of my career I worked for a very large

firm in Austin. One of our clients was the Texas

Lawyers and Insurance Exchange, legal malpractice. And

so, I worked with a senior partner on that and had

about a half a dozen cases. And I know legal

malpractice when I see it. And to not respond to a

request for discovery and identify witnesses to me is

classic.

He did not even seek to introduce any evidence to rebut the allegations in this proceeding. He didn't depose the Commission's witnesses to determine what their position would be in this case. And so, he's on the fly, hearing the testimony for the first time.

What we are asking for is a request to reopen so we can have an adequate address of the issues in this case. And I believe, I'm confident, that upon reopening a lot of the evidence will come out that will show that Ms. Weber did not money launder, Ms. Weber did not steal, that the seminal issues in this case that the ALJ appropriately found because no evidence on Ms. Weber's behalf that a perpetual inventory log was not kept, for example, that reports were not kept, and we would ask that it be reopened so that a fair hearing can occur.

And the counsel who represented Ms. Weber has been terminated. He will not be a part of this proceeding and I'll be happy to answer any questions.
