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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Grateful for everyone being here. I know we have a lot of energy in the room and that's always a good thing. So, thank you everyone for being here, those who came short distances and far.

# AGENDA ITEM NO. II

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: The first item is a presentation by the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation, Angela and Ryan this is your item.

MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: Good morning,
Commissioners. For the record, my name is Angela
Zgabay-Zgarba, the Director of Administration. Item
two in your notebook is a briefing item. In the June
21st meeting, I provided a briefing of staff's intent
to enter into a promotional and sponsorship agreement
with the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation.

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Today I have Ryan Mindell, our Deputy Executive

Director, joining me, as well as Chris Cassidy and Cory

Crowley to provide additional information on the

museum. Ryan, I'll turn it over to you.

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MR. MINDELL: Thanks, Angela. Good morning, Chairman and Commissioners. For the record, my name is Ryan Mindell, I'm the Deputy Executive Director.

As Angela mentioned, and you have previously approved, we'll be entering into a promotional and sponsorship agreement with the National Medal of Honor Museum. I've been fortunate enough to tour the museum site twice now, most recently with the chairman. And as you know, the site is -- and what they're building is just incredible.

This partnership is so perfect for us at the Texas lottery, because the museum's mission is so aligned with our beneficiaries. Between the obvious connection with highlighting veterans as compared to the great support we provide for the Fund for Veterans Assistance, the museum is also building an educational institute. So again, their twin missions of veterans and education align so well with what we do here at the Lottery.

Our partnership's going to provide

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multiple benefits, social media posts, signage, Texas

Lottery is even sponsoring discounted tickets to the

Museum for all Texas Veterans with free admission for

Texas active duty military. With how great this

partnership will be, we thought it would be beneficial

to have representatives from the museum here to provide

some more information.

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So with that, I'll introduce Cory
Crowley, who's the Executive Vice President of
Development and External Affairs at the National Medal
of Honor Museum. In his current role, Cory oversees
all internal and external messaging, public affairs,
community relations, government relations and branding.
He's also founded and consulted for several successful
startups, and Cory had helped lead the effort to
recover and restore the historic USS Iowa Battleship
turn into a successful maritime museum anchored in San
Pedro, California.

Last, but certainly not least, is

Captain Chris Cassidy. He's the National Medal of

Honor Museum Foundation's President and CEO. Chris is
a graduate of the United States Naval Academy and MIT.

He has distinguished himself as a Navy SEAL and Captain
in the US Navy, serving 11 years, as well as spending

17 years as a NASA astronaut with three missions and

over 377 days in space. Chris is one of three Navy SEALs to go on to become an astronaut. So with that, I'll turn it over to them.

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CAPTAIN CASSIDY: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners. We really sincerely appreciate your time and your partnership, and thank you for allowing us to have a few moments to tell you about our project.

You know, we couldn't be more excited and proud to deliver a national museum to right here in Texas. It'll be in the center of the DFW Metroplex in Arlington, the entertainment district, and some folks in the building here, are aware of the process by which it arrived in Texas. A national competition ultimately — originally around 20 cities, it got down to between Denver and Arlington in the final throes, and for all good reasons, Texas won.

The center of this country, the center of the Metroplex, a large airport, sports stadiums, Cowboys, Rangers, old and new stadium, Six Flags, and all the reasons that everyone here in this room is so familiar with why Texas is a great place for veterans to do their work and to plant the flag. So, for that, we are about a 25-person foundation, so excited to deliver this.

We're about halfway through our construction of the building. Come by and see us anytime up in Arlington. We started March 25th of '22, last year. That incidentally, March 25th is Medal of Honor Day in our nation every single year and in 2025 March, we'll have our grand opening. So we're about halfway through the build cycle.

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The project itself is really threefold. There was a little bit mentioned in the introduction, the physical bricks and mortar museum, which I'll talk about that in a second. The second leg is our National Medal of Honor Griffin Leadership Institute.

And we're really excited about how that can impact the nation. The museum will be our avenue through which people that can come and visit in person can be inspired through the stories of Medal of Honor recipients. But it's really how do we give this motivation, inspiration and patriotism to everyone in the nation, and that's where the institute will take its effect.

We'll have a Center for Youth where we call the character excellent -- A Center for Character Excellence, and a center for adults, both of which those centers are delivering content right now. We've partnered with the NFL and are delivering an online

program to school districts, 29,000 of them. Because of the NFL's existing Character Playbook program, that partnership will be in classrooms this school year, so we're excited about that.

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A couple months ago in March we had our first in-person adult program, 25 participants from industries around, a variety of industries and folks from around the country. Four days they came to Arlington and we had three different Medal of Honor recipients there, professionally run curriculum, which we received a lot of fantastic feedback and we'll deliver the second of those programs in October, just a couple months from now.

So, those are the first two legs. And the third leg is -- or one of the things that we're often asked is, wait a minute, this is a national project, why the heck isn't it in Washington, D.C.?

Well, our answer to that is a monument. We'll be delivering a monument on the National Mall. And Cory can talk about the legislative process because he's been really the heavy load carrier for that. But we're proud to say that this project is very unifying in its nature because in 2021, we were approved 416 to 0 and 100 to 0 in the Senate, 416 to 0 in the House of Representatives, to be authorized to build a monument

for Medal of Honor recipients.

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We're working through the process right now to identify the exact plot of land on our nation's capital and the verbiage has it within a thousand feet of the Lincoln Memorial, which we think is very fitting because President Lincoln is the president who put the medal into existence in 1861.

Since that time, there's been 3,516 awards of the medal and 65 of those people are living today. And so that's why we're working very hard to get this thing built as fast as we can because we're all not getting any younger, neither are the Medal of Honor recipients. So we want as many of those 65 to walk through the doors with us and celebrate this construction project.

On a personal level, I served in the military for 28 years and I loved every bit of it. I was able to do a lot of cool things in the SEAL teams and at NASA. Been a Texas resident for about 20 years. Sorry, most of that was in Houston, but that time in uniform was so meaningful to me. And as I was hanging that uniform up, the opportunity was offered to me to come be part of this project. And I had never thought about nonprofit work when I was in the transition process, kind of thinking I would work at SpaceX or

some other aerospace company. But as soon as I learned that this was an opportunity that I didn't even know the museum was being built, it immediately filled the void of how am I going to get that feeling of serving the country? And that's what I feel, we feel, we're working hard to deliver something to the country. It just so happens to be that Texas is the holder of the keys. But it's a national project.

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So with that, I'd like to introduce and hand it over to Cory. Cory and I tag team our leadership on this project and he's been really instrumental in the whole process. So, Cory?

MR. CROWLEY: Yeah, maybe just a few additional notes to what Chris said about the project at a macro level a bit. You know, a lot of people think of the Medal of Honor, you think of the acts of valor that led these individuals to earn the medal and to receive it from our country, but what it really is about is values. And this museum isn't a museum to war, it's a museum to common individuals who took those values, put them into practice, and then used them to do uncommon things.

And what we want to do is inspire every visitor to do those same things, to put those acts of values to work in their own lives, their communities,

their families, their schools. And that's what this partnership with the Texas Lottery is going to allow us to do, bring more students into the museum, make the barrier to entry for them getting there low, and be sure that the veterans who are part of those 40 million who stood next to the fewer than 4,000 who received the medal, but that they're also able to be celebrated and thanked for their role in all of this as well. So, that's what we're trying to do.

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As Chris mentioned, we'll be open in March of 2025 and you can come and see the construction site prior to that. We'd love to have you. But certainly when the doors are open, it will be a beacon for the country that Texas has led the way on. And of those 65 living Medal of Honor recipients, 10 of them are Texans. So you've got one-sixth of all the living legacies that we're doing this project for and that we're trying to preserve for the country right here in the state.

So, thank you very much for this partnership and for your time.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you.

Commissioners, do you have any thoughts, comments, please? Any?

MR. CROWLEY: I think, Commissioner --

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or Chairman, we do have a video, as we close out.

We're blessed to have four former Commanders in Chief
as honorary chairs of this project. And they're all
very involved and engaged. It's bipartisan as Chris
mentioned, a completely national unifying project. And
you can also see a little bit of the building and what
it will look like in this video as well.

III 1.5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. Next item 16 is a report from the Bingo Advisory Committee. Trace, 17 your item. 18 MR. SMITH: Wow, I gotta follow that? 19 Man, that's a tall order. All right. 20 Good morning, Commissioners, Chairman, 21 and Commissioner Fields. Thank y'all for letting me 22 speak again today. 23 Yesterday, the Bingo Advisory Committee

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met and discussed a few items. Most importantly, the

Bingo Advisory Committee developed and approved their

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annual report to be submitted to you which I will read to you now.

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Section 2001.060 of the Government Code requires an annual charitable bingo report by the Texas Lottery Commission to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House and the Legislature. 16 TAC 402.106(n) requires an annual report by the Bingo Advisory Committee to the Commission. Although the statute and the rule contains slightly different elements, this report provides the Commission with the information required by both the statute and the rule and additional information so that it is comprehensive.

This report uses data provided by the charitable bingo division. This data may not have been audited yet. The statute uses the term net proceeds while the rule uses the term net receipts. For the purposes of this report, the terms are synonymous.

Gross receipts. Gross receipts fell slightly in 2022 after a significant bounce back in 2021. Calendar year 2022 saw 894-million in gross receipts versus 938.4-million in gross receipts in 2021. This 5 percent drop year-over-year was to be expected after the 2020 pandemic low of 696.8-million. The 2022 calendar year gross receipts are in line or slightly above gross receipts for years prior to the

pandemic.

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Pull-tab sales continue to drive overall sales. Supply chain issues are largely disappearing, but the diversity of pull-tab products has declined as manufacturers seek to consolidate product lines and cut costs.

Adjusted gross receipts. The term adjusted gross receipts is defined as the amount remaining after prizes are paid. At \$197-million, AGR also dropped slightly in the 2022 year. That is an 8 percent drop from the 214.2-million recorded in 2021 and a 29 percent increase over 152.5-million in 2020. Yet again, it is in line with the years prior to the pandemic.

Net proceeds or net receipts. Overall, net proceeds to charities, which is the amount of money retained by the charity conductors of bingo after payment of all expenses, saw a decline in 2022. At 28.5 million, that's nearly 37 percent lower than the historical high of 45.4-million in 2021. However, a three-year average using 2020 to 2022 data is almost \$32-million. This includes the historical pandemic low in 2020 of \$21.9-million, 2021's historical bounceback of \$45.4-million, and 2022's near return to normal at 28.5-million.

The three-year average is comparable to pre-pandemic annual net proceeds. Net proceeds were 14.5 percent of adjusted gross receipts in 2022 compared to 14.3 in 2020 and 21.2 percent in 2021.

Charitable distributions. The Bingo

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Enabling Act requires charity conductors to distribute for charitable purposes all net proceeds that exceed the maximum capital reserve allowed by the Act. Some organizations chose to maintain capital reserves lower than allowed and distribute net proceeds beyond what may be statutorily required.

Maintaining a capital reserve is fundamental to a business. This explains the difference in net proceeds to charitable distributions to the charities.

Charitable distributions for 2022 were \$27.9-million compared to 20.8-million in 2020, and in 40-million in 2021.

Expenses. Aggregate expenses held the line in 2022 at \$168.5-million compared to 168.8-million in 2021.

Attendance. At 10.1-million people, attendance declined nearly 10 percent compared to 11.1-million in the 2021 calendar year. This is a 44 percent decline since 2007, which was 17.9-million.

This steady decline remains the biggest threat to charitable bingo. We're hopeful that recent legislative changes which allow for new prize structure and more temporary sessions will provide charity conductors with additional tools to stem the attendance decline.

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As we've noted in the past, research indicates a general lack of awareness is a key challenge for charitable bingo. Bingo is not top-of-mind compared to other entertainment options. Private sector digital advertising conducted last year showed promising returns on investment. However, those initiatives have not achieved a scale needed to slow or reverse attendance declines.

Providing feedback. The BAC has successfully provided feedback and comments to the Charitable Bingo Operations Division staff and Commissioners on all administrative rules and amendments.

Website review. The BAC is still currently reviewing and collecting data to report its recommendations to the staff and the Commissioners.

Reporting. The BAC successfully reported to the Commission updates on the BAC's activities, industry accomplishments, challenges and

concerns.

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Annual report. The BAC has submitted the required annual report to the Commission and to the Charitable Bingo Operations Division's Director.

Concluding comment. Most all metrics — by most all metrics, charitable bingo returned to near normal historical norms in 2022. A dip in AGR for charities is always something to keep an eye on. After all, charitable benefits are the reason for being. Yet, charitable bingo remains a niche entertainment and gaming option. We will closely monitor implementation of Senate Bill 643's changes, with hopes that the tools and flexibility it provides will help charity conductors retain existing customers and attract new ones.

The Bingo Advisory Committee remains committed to working with the Commissioners and the Charitable Bingo Division staff to advise and respond to the issues that arise this year and those to come. We particularly want to thank the Lottery and Bingo Division staff for their work during this past legislative session. We appreciate the Commission giving this important forum, and we are prepared to respond to any request you have of us. We respectfully request that the Commissioners vote to reinstate the

Bingo Advisory Committee for a one-year period.

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And that concludes that report.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Trace, thank you. Before I open it up to our other Commissioners, I'll ask, Cindy, your thoughts, if any.

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: The Bingo Advisory
-- well, I don't know if that's on or not. Thank you
for your leadership, by the way.

MR. SMITH: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: And thank all of you for everything that you do for charitable bingo.

The Bingo Advisory Committee continues to fulfill its purpose to advise the Commission on the needs and problems of the State's bingo industry. So because of that, I move that the Commission approve continuing the BAC for fiscal year 2024, with the same members, who are you, Trace Smith, bingo conductor; Stacie D. Johnston, our newest member, bingo conductor; Melodye Green, commercial lessor; Emile Bourgoyne, I hope I said that right, bingo manufacturer; Tommy Duncan Jr., bingo distributor; Jason Pohl, bingo conductor; Veronica Uriegas, charity lessor; Corey Harris, bingo conductor; and Michael Anastasio, charity lessor. And also approve the work plan for fiscal year 2024, including the following items, which you all have

also approved at the BAC meeting yesterday.

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MR. SMITH: Yes, ma'am.

COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Encourage industry licensees and stakeholders to provide feedback and comments during the legislative Sunset review of the Texas Lottery Commission and CBOD, and provide comments to the Commission regarding the agency's Sunset review. Provide feedback and comments on rulemaking related to the implementation of SB 643. Identify other potential rule or procedural changes that help organizations address challenges related to conducting charitable bingo. Any potential recommendations on changes to how bingo games are played shall be clearly authorized by Texas law and will not include electronic bingo, including electronic pull-tabs or any other activities not authorized by law or video confirmation of paper pull tabs.

Provide feedback and comments to CBOD staff and Commissioners on changes to administrative rules and Chapter 402 and any other new additional amendments. Work with CBOD staff to identify ways to increase filing of quarterly reports and other forms, and making payment of prize fees using the online filing system.

Review components of the agency's

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charitable bingo website, including the listing of BAC members, and recommend elements and information to be included in future website updates.

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Provide reports at each Commission meeting that include status updates of the BAC's activities, industry accomplishments, challenges or concerns, and develop the required BAC annual report to the Commission on the state of charitable bingo industry and submit to the Commission and to the Charitable Bingo Director by July 12th, 2024.

MR. BIARD: Commissioners, I believe that Mr. Bresnen would like to address the board before y'all vote on that.

MR. BRESNEN: Thank you very much. You would think a lobbyist would know to keep his mouth shut when the votes are there. But I do want to say thank you very much, particularly Commissioner Fields, for the time and attention you've paid to the industry in general, the Bingo Advisory Committee, and to LaDonna and Tyler and the rest of the staff. BAC is a great way for us to communicate back with other parts of the industry with the new legislation. It's given us a way to spread a message that needs to be spread about some of the new things.

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### AGENDA ITEM NO. IV

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is a lottery rule proposal. Tyler, this is your item.

MR. VANCE: Morning Chairman, Commissioners. My name's Tyler Vance, Assistant General Counsel, Legal Services Division. I have for your consideration today proposed amendments to Lottery Rules 401.152, 401.302, 401.362, and 401.370. This is a bit of a variety pack today.

The first one to -- 401.152, will define the term director to mean throughout the rules the lottery operations director, to resolve any ambiguity that's not the executive director. The proposed amendments to 401.302 eliminate a redundant word. The proposed amendments to 401.362 provide for an additional option to document lottery tickets that have been destroyed by a fire. And it also eliminates a \$25 administrative fee for packs of unactivated tickets that are unsalable due to the damage of a fire. the proposed amendments to 401.370 also eliminate a \$25 fee for destruction and clarify that the report of the lost tickets goes through the Commission's enforcement division through the operator -- lottery operator hotline.

Staff recommends that you propose these

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Annika has been with the agency since 2006, 17 years in the office of controller. She's been recently promoted to financial operations manager when I was promoted to controller. So, I'm confident that she will represent the agency and the OC team in the interim, and I'm very proud of her to have her take this place.

So, then I'll let Robert say introductions for our new seat at the table.

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MR. TIRLONI: Thank you, Kelly. Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. I also want to talk to you today about a little change that we're going to be making related to this agenda item.

You'll remember that we had a significant organizational change almost a full year ago when Gary promoted Ryan into the role of Deputy Executive Director. At that time, I became the operations director and Will became the products manager. For the past year, I've continued to deliver the sales presentation in this setting, but the time has come for us to transition over to Will. So a little bit of history about Will.

Will joins the agency nine years ago in 2014 as a promotion specialist in our advertising and promotions department. I stole Will away and brought

him to the products department in May of 2016, and he started working on our scratch ticket portfolio at that time. He was, and still is, a shining star and he was promoted to be the scratch ticket production coordinator, and then as I mentioned a year ago, he stepped into the products manager role.

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I've been super impressed with the great work that Will has done in the short time he has been the products manager, including already being asked to present information at an industry conference regarding our scratch portfolio just this past May. And of course, he did a great job. I'm sure this will be the first of many presentations Will is going to be asked to deliver about the various successes that we have had here in Texas.

Being directly involved in all things related to our product portfolio and our sales is something that I've been focused on for well over 20 years. And while I am in a different role now, my focus on that area of our business has not decreased. I'll always be available to you all if you ever need any information. And if you'll have me, I may even make a guest appearance during this agenda item every so often.

I know Will's going to do a great job

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telling you about the agency sales and our special product offerings. And if you don't have any questions for me at this time, I will hand the baton over and Kelly and Will will deliver the sales information for you starting today.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners? Okay.

MR. TIRLONI: Thank you.

MS. STUCKEY: All right. So, getting into the sales presentation, Will and I will be providing an update on sales through the week ending August 5th. So, looking at the first slide there, you'll see that through this 49-week period we've had total sales for fiscal year '23 of \$8,154,000,000. That's an increase of over 388-million or 5 percent over fiscal year '22 sales of 7,765,000,000 in sales up to this point in the fiscal year. Then looking at scratch sales, our '23 sales on the second orange bar on the right are \$6,290,000,000. And that is a .1 percent increase over fiscal year '22 or \$7.5million. Due to our strong draw sales this fiscal year, our scratch sales are making up currently 77.1 percent of our total sales compared to last year we were at 80.9 percent.

Then looking at draw sales, on those

blue bars on the right is fiscal year '23 showing draw sales of 1,864,000,000. That's a \$381-million increase or a 25.7 percent over fiscal year '22 sales of 1,483,000,000. And then I will go to the next slide and Will will take over for details by game.

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MR. RUSS: Thanks Kelly, and thank you Robert for that very nice introduction. Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning, Commissioners. As Robert mentioned, I'm here to give a further update on our sales.

Like Kelly said, the slide you see represents our sales through Saturday, August 5th and like Robert reported at the last meeting in June, this is all still really good news. Our draw game sales are up about 381-million. You can see that in the orange line towards the bottom of the slide.

The theme that we've talked about at our meetings throughout this entire fiscal remains the same, and that is jackpots. Since the last meeting, we've had two more impressive runs on the national games. Powerball reached a \$1-billion jackpot for the July 19th drawing, and you can see the year-over-year increase of 162-million in the last column, Mega Millions climbed to 1.58-billion for the August 8th drawing. On that game, we're realizing an increase of

87-million. Even the add-on features for the jackpot games have yielded impressive results. Lotto Extra, Megaplier, and Power Play, are all up significantly.

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The blue font in the middle of the slide represents our daily games. Pick 3 is the only game that's down, but the rest of the daily games make up for that, and we're up almost 4-million.

In conclusion for these draw games, the luck we've had with jackpots is the biggest reason for our \$381-million increase.

And now to move on to scratch sales, which are up about 7.5-million. We're currently at 6.2-billion in sales for this fiscal. We have lost some of the \$24-million gain that we saw at the last meeting, but we are monitoring the sales every day to see if we will break another scratch sales record this fiscal. I will update you on that at the October commission meeting. To sum this all up, we have a gain of almost 389-million overall.

I'd also like to close the loop on another item that was discussed last meeting. As you've probably seen in the news, the Teamsters Union and UPS reached a tentative contract agreement on July 25th, and our scratch ticket deliveries to retailers were not disrupted this month.

However, just last 3 Friday we completed our July transfer, so I wanted to go ahead and give you those more up-to-date numbers. 4 5 For this 11-month period, we've transferred 6 1,951,000,000 with 186-million to the Foundation School 7 Fund, 23.6 to the Texas Veterans Commission, and the remaining \$66.7-million from unclaimed prizes. 8 So for the Foundation School Fund, this 9 10 is an 8.2 percent increase, or 140.7-million when 11 compared to the first 11 months of '22. 12 And then the second half of this item is 1.3 the fiscal year '23 method of finance summary for the 14

third quarter ending May 31. In summary, the Commission's lottery account budget for 23 is 260.2million. Of this amount, 89.8 percent has been expended or encumbered through the third quarter, and bingo administration's budget funded by GR is 2.1million with 87 percent expended and encumbered through the third quarter. So this concludes this item.

Producing this report and the business plan is definitely a team effort with participation from all divisions. So, thanks to everyone in the agency that contributed. I would also like to extend special thanks to three people on my team, Angie Bland, Ami Barzelis, and Merry Mendoza. They keep the entire drafting, editing, and review process for this project on track and well organized. And it's not an overstatement to say that without them we would never get this project completed.

With that, I'm happy to answer any questions that you may have. And just a reminder, this item does require board approval.

Thank you, 15 Mr. Chairman. 16 You may recall in the June Commission 17 meeting you heard from Nelda in her legislative session 18 report about the rider that was placed in Article 9 of 19 House Bill 1, the Appropriations Act, regarding lottery 20 couriers, and you were also informed about the 21 proclamation issued by the Governor that included 22 statements regarding the constitutionality of that 23 rider. Also, in that June meeting, our General

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Counsel, Bob Biard, addressed the topic of third-party

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lottery couriers.

Two key points that Bob made on the record. One, as the statute is silent regarding third-party lottery courier services, and the activity related to these services is not contemplated in current law, the TLC has no jurisdiction or licensing authority over the activity. And two, the TLC has never proposed or adopted administrative rules condoning or prohibiting this activity.

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In your Commission meeting notebooks today, we have included the rider related to lottery couriers in Article 9 of the Appropriations Act, that section from the Senate Journal which lays out the legislative intent of the rider, and the Governor's proclamation.

Mr. Chairman, as House Bill 1 takes effect September 1st of this year, today I'm seeking direction from the Commission on the lottery courier matter.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Bob, are there any public speakers?

MR. BIARD: No, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners - on behalf of the Commissioners, Gary, thank you for
your comments. This agency is mindful and respectful
of the policy direction that has been provided by the

Legislature, and it is also respectful of the related statements Governor Abbott provided in his proclamation. Based on the latest official action taken, the Commission directs the Executive Director to take no action on the rider and to highlight the lottery courier issue during the agency's Sunset review process for the Sunset Commission to consider.

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Are there any questions or comments?

Okay. Seeing none, we'll move on to the next agenda item.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: The report on the agency Sunset review process. Ryan, this is your item.

MR. MINDELL: Thank you, Chairman,

in my June update, the agency has now started the
process of the Sunset review with the first step being
a self-evaluation report prepared by the agency. This
report, known as the SER, gives the agency an
opportunity to provide an overview of our entire
organization and operations to the Sunset Commission
and its staff. We also have the ability to identify
problems, opportunities, and issues that the agency
would like the Sunset Commission to review during that

process.

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I wanted to specifically note that the sole major issue that the agency has identified in its SER is the courier issue you just discussed. I've provided the draft SER to each of you. The main document in draft form is over 130 pages, but we'll be supplementing that document with numerous attachments, like the business plan you just gave Robert approval on, as well as other agency documents from over the past decade.

The draft SER will be finalized before a deadline at the end of this month, with potential edits focused on clarity and formatting. You will be provided the final formatted copy after it's submitted.

As with the business plan, this document was a massive undertaking over a very short timeframe. Staff across the agency contributed to this document, often with tight turnarounds, and while still completing all of their regular work.

I'd like to give special thanks to Myra Zamora, who each of you is familiar with. She did a great job helping track all the moving pieces and keeping everything running along smoothly.

Of course, our ultimate goal with the Sunset process is to see a bill passed in the next
