SMITH: Morning, Mr. Chairman, Bingo 20 Commissioner Fields and Commissioners. I'm pleased to 21 report that the Bingo Advisory Committee met yesterday 22 and we answered several important questions on the 23 agenda.

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training on the Open Meetings Act and the Public

We started out with the refresher

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Information Act, which was very informative. We also had four members of the Sunset Commission in attendance yesterday, which we were glad to have and look forward to helping in that process.

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We also had a discussion about the recent sale of the two major distributors of bingo product in the State of Texas. This sale brings the top two distributors of bingo products in the state together and puts roughly 70 to 75 percent of bingo product under one roof.

We also talked about the Comptroller audits of the units in the State of Texas. With swift action from Lisa Craven and the Comptroller, Glenn Hegar, they worked with LaDonna and Vivian to fix these charities' issues before they started. Also, thanks to Steve Bresnen for helping and orchestrating the quick resolution of these problems. And on a side note, it is Steve Bresnen's birthday today, so if y'all get a chance later, be sure to wish him a happy birthday.

The Bingo Advisory Committee also voted to unanimously support the draft rules from the staff for the rulemaking process.

And last, we are looking forward to receiving the applications to replace our member manufacturer representative Emile Bourgoyne, who is

retiring from the BAC in December. Thank you. 1 2 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 3 any discussion? Cindy? COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Just to -- I don't 4 know if this is on or not, but just a quick note. 5 6 Thank you for your continued leadership at the BAC and 7 also thanks to Emile for representing his industry for 8 all these years. And he's got big shoes to fill. 9 MR. SMITH: Yes. 10 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: And one thing I'd 11 like to bring up that Trace, he never fails to mention 12 at the BAC committee meetings, that he's grateful for 1.3 the level of cooperation that he now gets from the CBOD 14 staff, and in particular, LaDonna and Vivian. 1.5 state employees don't get compliments very often, 16 especially with regulatory agencies and I think it's 17 well deserved. three in your notebooks is an action item. Staff is
seeking Commission approval to issue the procurement
for lottery operations and services in late spring,
early summer of 2024. The current contract expires
August 31 of 2026. This is by far our largest
procurement and contract, and it takes a significant
amount of time and effort to go from issuance of an
RFP, award of a contract, and transition these services
throughout the state.

It is staff's intent to award the contract and have it negotiated and signed more than one year in advance, giving the opportunity for several months of transition. To allow the Commission the opportunity to have any discussion and advise you of milestones, we intend to provide periodic updates until such time as we've made a recommendation for award.

20	receiving my full attention and the full attention of
21	the entire senior management team at the Lottery. As a
22	reminder, under the current lottery operator contract,
23	IGT is paid on a percentage of gross lottery sales, and
24	that contract is currently valued at approximately \$160

million annually. This particular procurement above

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all the others that we manage is critical to the success of the Texas Lottery. It's important that we keep you apprised of our progress as we meet our milestones in the development of the request for proposal. We're being methodical in our approach, mindful of even the smallest detail, incorporating lottery industry and State of Texas best practices, including contractors, into this process, and we're purposely being conservative in the timing of the issuance of our request for proposal. We are very fortunate to have Angela Zgarba overseeing this process for us as she is one of the most knowledgeable and experienced contract managers in the State of Texas.

Ultimately, our desire is to issue a request for proposal that represents the best in procurement in the State of Texas; Angela's going to help us see to that, and one that will yield the most value for the Foundation School Fund and for the Fund for Veterans Assistance. So Commissioners, we look forward to briefing you on our progress as this moves over the next few months. Thank you.

MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: Thank you.

Tyler, your item. 16 MR. VANCE: Yes, sir. We have for your 17 consideration today the possible proposal of amendments 18 to bingo rules 402.200, .203, .400, .401, .404, .405, 19 .413, .420, .451, .452, .503, .600, .706, .707. These 20 rules are necessary to implement three bills related to 21 bingo that passed in the most recent session and 22 therefore, staff recommends that you propose these so 23 we can publish them the Texas Register and open it up 24 for comment. And of course, as Trace mentioned, the

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BAC has recommended proposing these rules as well.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is a report on lottery sales and revenue.

MR. GRIEF: Mr. Chairman, if I could just say a couple of things?

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: At any time.

MR. GRIEF: So, before we have -- I'm sorry, can we have the lights up, please? So before we go through the sales report this morning, I did want to introduce our new Controller, Sergio Rey, to you. But before I do that, I'm going to publicly thank Annika Guarnero sitting over here in the beautiful green dress for serving as Acting Controller for the last several weeks.

We all understand that people retire or leave the agency for a variety of reasons from time to time, but it's how well prepared we are and how deep our bench is that really matters. And Annika has done an outstanding job in stepping up in an acting capacity and filling that role of Controller for us, and we owe her a debt of gratitude.

So, now I would like to introduce Mr.

Sergio Rey, standing at the podium, our new agency

Controller. Sergio, comes to us after a two-year stint

at the Texas Water Development Board. And before that,

a decade of experience working at the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles.

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Sergio started a week ago Monday, and he has had to hit the ground running, coming on board in the middle of a billion-dollar Powerball jackpot, with our Sunset review now officially kicked off, and our lottery operator procurement process getting into full swing, among other things. So, we're counting on great things from Sergio going forward, and I've asked him to address the Commission today with some brief comments and answer any questions that the Commissioners might have.

MR. REY: Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
Commissioners. My name is Sergio Rey, the new
Controller. I'm very excited to be a part of what I've
in this short two weeks have noticed is a great
organization. I'm very proud to be here, and I look
forward to continuing providing service to the State of
Texas and supporting the mission of this great agency.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Sergio, you are absolutely appreciated and we're grateful for your experience that you're bringing to the table. And we know that you're, as Gary said, already hit the ground running and doing great things and we have high expectations of you and we know that you're going to

deliver great things for Texas Lottery and the State as you always have. We're excited.

MR. REY: Thank you.

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MS. GUARNERO: Good morning, Mr.

Chairman and Commissioners. My name is Annika

Guarnero, Financial Operations Manager in the Office of the Controller. With me this morning is Lottery

Operations Products Manager, Will Russ. We are excited to provide an update on final sales and revenue results for fiscal year 2023. We will begin our presentation with revenue highlights.

with \$2,162,000,000 in accrued revenue transfers to the State, the highest revenue transfer to our beneficiaries in the history of the Texas Lottery. Of that overall transfer amount, \$2.131-billion went to the Foundation School Fund, and then additionally, \$29.7-million went directly to the Texas Veterans Commission from the sale of scratch ticket games dedicated to the fund for Veterans Assistance. This is the largest annual transfer to the Veterans Fund since the designated scratch ticket games began in FY2010. Veterans revenue for FY23 exceeded last fiscal year by more than \$3.6-million.

Thanks to the hard work of our entire

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lottery team, our vendor partners, and our retailers, our cumulative revenue transfers to the beneficiaries are now more than \$37.7-billion.

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Here we have the revenue records that we made this year. These revenue records were made possible by Texas Lottery generating \$8.73-billion in sales, making this our 13th consecutive record breaking year in lottery sales. The new sales record exceeded last year's record by \$428-million.

Another record was prizes paid to players with more than \$5.9-billion in prizes won by players. This broke the previous record set in FY22 by more than \$244-million.

In FY23, our retailers were paid more than \$436-million in Commission payments. This was also another record in payments to retailers. We'd also like to note that we concluded the fiscal year with an administrative expenditure rate of 3.12 percent, which is well below our statutorily allowed 7 percent.

Now moving on to detailed sales data.

As mentioned earlier, final sales for FY23 were \$8.73-billion and surpassed the previous sales record set last year by \$428.8-million over fiscal year '22. To expand on those sales numbers a little further, we

ended the fiscal year with \$6.729-billion in scratch ticket sales as noted on the second orange column. This is also a new sales record, marking the best year of scratch ticket sales since we began selling tickets. This reflects a sales increase of more than \$1.99-million above the \$6.727-billion sales record set last year.

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Draw sales concluded the year with \$1.996-billion in sales as noted on the second blue bar. Also, this is a new draw sales record with an increase of \$426.8-million over last year's draw sales record of \$1.569- billion.

Okay. So, this slide provides an overview of the 32-year history of scratch and draw games sales for the Commission. Consistent with the prior slide, scratch ticket sales are noted with the orange bar and draw sales are noted with the blue bar. We began back in 1992 with \$591,000 of scratch tickets sold in their first year of operations with no draw sales, now growing to \$8.73-billion in total sales per fiscal year 2023.

One of the take-aways that I would like to share from this chart is that over the last five years, total sales have grown from \$5.6-billion in FY2018 to \$8.73-billion in FY2023, which is a \$2.47-

billion growth, or a 39.6 percent increase.

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That concludes my portion of this presentation. I'll now turn it over to Will who will get into the details of those record-breaking sales.

MR. RUSS: Thank you so much, Annika.

Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning,

Commissioners. For the record, I'm Will Russ and I'm the Products Manager. As Annika mentioned, I'm going to get more into the details of our sales for fiscal year '23.

So, on this slide you'll see where the sales are coming from. The jackpot games are in the top in the white font and Lotto Texas, Mega Millions, Powerball, and their respective add-on features are all up significantly from fiscal year '22.

As we discussed at meetings throughout the fiscal year, this is because of jackpots, and here's the quick recap. On November 7th, Powerball hit 1.9-billion. On January 13th, Mega Millions hit 1.35-billion. In April, we ended the historic Lotto Texas run when it hit 95-million. On July 19th, Powerball had another \$1-billion jackpot. And then just right at the end of the fiscal year in August, Mega Millions hit 1.58-billion.

This was a historic year in terms of

jackpots. And staff across the agency and at IGT worked hard to handle the unprecedented demand. Back to the slide.

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Texas Two Step is down very slightly. We are okay with this, all things considered.

Moving on to the middle of the slide in blue are our daily games. As a whole, they're up about 6.3-million. As we've seen over the last several years, Pick 3 is down again, but Daily 4 is up. In fact, Daily 4 has seen a yearly increase since it was introduced in 2008.

Regarding Pick 3, we'll continue to support it this year with monthly exclusive co-ops that retailers and players both enjoy. And as you'll see in a few slides, it's still a very important part of our portfolio.

Finally, Cash 5 is basically flat, but up overall and All or Nothing is up a notable 6-million. Go to the next one, Steve.

The next slide that we look at once a year around this time represents the total sales broken out between the two different product categories, and I really like it this year because it's a perfect illustration of the influence of all the jackpots.

The scratch draw split is typically

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about 80/20 or 81/19, and this year you can see how much the jackpots got players out with the 77/23 split. Go to the next one, Steve.

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This pie chart is the draw game breakdown representing the 1.99-billion in sales. Please note that the add-on features are included with their respective base game. You can see that large Powerball slice at the top taking the number one position. Our number two, which won't be a surprise either, is Mega Millions in that kind of teal slice. And then there's Pick 3 hitting almost 300-million for third place.

One thing I found interesting was despite Lotto Texas' historic run in the spring, Pick 3 still held the number three spot, despite it being down year-over-year. Daily 4 continues to grow, but less significantly than in recent years, because I'm sure our players were gravitating towards the jackpots we saw. Next slide, please.

So, this is the same pie chart, but now we're talking about scratch. So, this is the almost 6.73-billion in scratch sales broken down by price point. The top three spots are the same as last year. Number one is the \$10, number two is the \$20, and number three is the \$5. However, as you can see, the

10 and 20 are very close. I won't be surprised if the 20 pass surpasses the 10 next year. The \$50 price point maintains its position in the number four spot, and the sales for the \$100 price point are just growing, and I will talk more about that over the next few slides. Next. Thanks, Steve.

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This chart is just showing the different price points for scratch with a year-over-year comparison. So the orange bars are '22 and the blue bars are '23. The big takeaway here, which will be no surprise to anyone, is that the higher price points continue to be popular and they are driving our sales. Let's start all the way on the right with the \$100 price point, with about 575-million in sales, up about 363-million from '22.

It's no surprise here, considering the first \$100 game, \$20 Million Supreme, was only out for a few months in '22. In April, we launched this year's most important game, the \$100 Loteria Supreme, and that played a major role in the increased sales year-over-year for that price point.

As a side note, I want to reassure the Commission, we are thinking very hard about when to introduce the next \$100 game. Product staff is currently working on getting the new game in the

warehouse, and it should be on sale sometime early in calendar '24. I will keep you posted on that at a future meeting.

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Moving back to the recap, the \$50 price point is down a little, but that's expected considering there was a \$100 game in market the entirety of '23, unlike '22, and the introduction of the second \$100 game in April.

The \$30 price point remained relatively flat, but I am hoping some introductions we have planned will change things for '24.

The \$20 and \$10 price points are both up. There aren't huge gains in either, but they are up, and I think that will be a continued trend.

The \$5 price point is down, but again, that's expected with the growth at the 10 and the 20.

The \$3 price point is relatively flat, and we continue to see declines on the \$2 price point, but we have had a very successful year for our veterans dedicated tickets, and we set a new veterans sales record as Annika mentioned.

Unfortunately, the \$1 price point is also down, but we have a new strategy for it that will be implemented over '24 and into '25. Next slide, please.

This is the final slide and it's just a simple list of the best-selling scratch ticket games.

Let's start at the top. The \$100 \$20 Million Supreme has not been the number one game in the daily sales for a while, but it was still very in demand at the beginning of '23 and got the number one spot overall.

It pushed the \$20 Loteria down to the number two spot.

\$1,000,000 Crossword in the number three spot is noteworthy because I think it's a great looking ticket that offers extended play for our core players.

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The number four and number five spots are held by the paramount \$10 Loteria. Please note this is a core game that is always in market. During the year, the first game ran out and was replaced with the second. If we combine the sales of those two games, it would be the number one.

I also want to point out the \$100 Loteria Supreme at the number six spot. It's towards the center of this ranking, but remember, it only came out in April. We view this game as the main reason our scratch sales were record breaking. Without it, we would've certainly fell behind.

Finally, I want to note that the Loteria themed games take up seven of the 15 spots on here and assure you that we are working hard to keep these

tickets looking fresh, but also maintaining the appeal 1 2 that attracts so many of our players. Go one more, 3 Steve. To recap, because of the constant 4 5 jackpots and consequently record breaking sales, '23 6 resulted in the highest revenue transfer to our 7 beneficiaries in the history of the Texas Lottery. 8 With that, I'll wrap up. Thank you so 9 much, Commissioners. If there are no questions, I will 10 turn it over to Mr. Grief, who I believe has some 11 comments. 12 COMMISSIONER SAENZ: I have one 13 question. 14 MR. RUSS: Yes, sir. 1.5 COMMISSIONER SAENZ: Do I understand 16 that the Loteria portfolio exceeds 1.3-billion in sales 17 this year? Is that my understanding? 18 MR. RUSS: I don't know the exact number 19 off the top of my head, but the Loteria games accounted 20 for more than 27 percent of our total sales. That I do 21 know, but I don't know the exact sales number. 22 COMMISSIONER SAENZ: Impressive. 23 MR. RUSS: Yes. We agree and we'll keep 24 them up. Yeah.

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MR. GRIEF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

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So, Commissioners, we're obviously very proud of the results that you've heard today, but these results really shouldn't come as any surprise because the Texas Lottery is the undisputed industry leader, innovating and modernizing our lottery products, all while closely ensuring we stay within our statutory guidelines.

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Going forward, we don't have any way of predicting how high jackpots might go or what kind of economy we're going to be dealing with in the coming year. But what you as the board can count on, is knowing that the absolute best and brightest people in the lottery industry, both within our organization, and within the organizations of our outstanding vendor partners, are going to continue to have a laser focus every single day on keeping the Texas Lottery moving forward, working closely with our valuable retailers located across the state to generate much needed revenue for public education and veteran services.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any comments?

COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Every year we're like we can't beat that, can't beat that, and then you guys keep doing it.

MR. GRIEF: We're a team.

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COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thank you, guys. 1 2 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yeah, we're incredibly 3 grateful for your combined, all lottery employees' leadership, and those numbers are a direct reflection 4 5 of the effort that is put in daily, year-round, 6 regardless of your position within the the lottery. 7 You all help produce those numbers and on behalf of the 8 Commission, we're grateful for your commitment to the 9 mission of the lottery. 10 Annika and Will, I know this was your 11 first venture there and y'all made it seem as if y'all 12 have been doing this for years. So good job on your 1.3 presentation and we look forward to seeing y'all at the 14 next Commission meeting, so --1.5 MR. RUSS: Thank you so much. Thank 16 you. 17 Okay. CHAIRMAN RIVERA: 18 19 AGENDA ITEM NO. X 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. Next item, 21 Annika, you're going to --22 MS. GUARNERO: Yes. 23 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: -- stay right there 24 and you're going to talk about transfers to the State 25 and the agency's budget.

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MS. GUARNERO: For the record, my name is Annika Guarnero, Financial Operations Manager in the Office of the Controller. Commissioners, for this item, we have included in your notebooks the accrued transfers and allocations to the Foundation School Fund, and Texas Veterans Commission, as well as the allocation of unclaimed prizes for fiscal year ending August 31, 2023.

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Total accrued transfers to the State amounted to \$2.161-billion for fiscal year 2023. And as I mentioned in the sales presentation, that was a record total transfer.

Of that transfer to the State, \$2.131-billion was transferred to the Foundation School Fund. \$29.7-million were transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission, with the remaining balance of \$88.9-million transferred from unclaimed prizes.

Total cumulative transfers to the Foundation School Fund through August of 2023 total more than \$31.7-billion, and the cumulative accrued transfer to the State are more than \$37.7-billion.

Also included in your notebook is the agency's final FY2023 method of finance summary for the fiscal year. The Texas Lottery Commission's account budget for FY2023 was \$316.47-million. Of this amount,

98.2-percent was encumbered and expended. The bingo 1 2 administration budget funded by general revenue was 3 \$2.1-million with 83.6 percent extended and encumbered. That concludes my portion of this agenda 4 5 item. 6 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion? Okay. Annika, good job. 7 8 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thank you. 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank y'all. 10 AGENDA ITEM NO. XI 11 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is 12 agency sunset review process. Ryan, your item. 1.3 MR. MINDELL: Good morning, Chairman and 14 Commissioners. For the record, my name is Ryan 1.5 Mindell, Deputy Executive Director. I have a brief 16 update on the Sunset process, specifically our 17 timeline. On September 1, we submitted the 18 self-evaluation report that you approved at our last 19 Last week we met with Sunset staff for the meeting. 20 formal kickoff of the review of our agency. We have a 21 number of additional meetings scheduled in the upcoming 22 weeks. We anticipate that the staff review portion of 23 the process will continue through early next year, with

a staff report potentially issued by Sunset in April of

24

25

2024.

I will continue to keep you informed

about where we are in this process as it continues over

the next year. Happy to answer any questions you have.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners,

any discussions? Okay. Thank you.

AGENDA ITEM NO. XII

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is the Internal Auditor's report.

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MS. BROWN: My name is Darlene Brown for the record, and I'm your Internal Auditor. In your notebook there's two items. One is informational and the other is an action item.

So, the first item I'll go over is our annual internal audit report. This is a report that's required by the Texas Internal Audit Act, and it's due November 1st, gets submitted to the Governor's Office, Legislative Budget Board and the State Auditor's Office. The State Auditor provides the components of the report and the content is based on operations on behalf of your agency.

So, first thing in that report is the fiscal year 2023 annual internal audit plan status, which we completed. It's also a copy of our peer review outcome, which we passed as a firm and the 2024

annual internal audit plan that we're proposing, a description of the external audit services that you procure as an agency in 2023, and your policies for reporting suspected fraud and abuse.

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So, from fiscal year 2023, as a recap, we completed the physical security of the new office operations and where we identified eight findings related to the Facilities Commission itself, handling of the building, all of those findings except for one have been closed now. The business continuity and jackpot estimations audits identified no findings and rated those internal controls as generally effective.

We also identify best practice processes to manage your business risk in all of those audits.

I'm going to move on to the proposed fiscal year 2024 annual audit plan, and this one will require an action.

We're proposing to complete six audits this year and two consulting engagements. The six audits that we're proposing is a ticket warehouse operations, legislative change management processes, procurement and contracting processes, retailer incentive and bonus programs, claims and prize management, customer, stakeholder, and retailer satisfaction and complaint handling.

1	The two consulting engagements that we
2	propose are the CBOD licensing process and the lottery
3	operator contract solicitation process. So with that,
4	we'll check in and see how the RFP is going and make
5	sure it's all in compliance with regulations.
6	We developed this audit plan based upon
7	our risk assessment and prioritized the risks with
8	leadership. While our audit plan has estimated timing,
9	we will continue to work with management on the exact
10	timing to make sure it fits their schedule and needs.
11	We estimate that the audit plan will
12	take 2,234 hours to execute and will stay within the
13	\$300,000 budget. I'm seeking your approval for the
14	fiscal year '24 annual internal audit plan, and I'll be
15	happy to address any questions you may have.
16	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners,
17	any discussion on Darlene's
18	COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Motion to approve.
19	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: report? We have a
20	motion to approve.
21	MR. SAENZ: Second.
22	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: We have a second? All
23	in favor say aye.
24	(Chorus of "ayes")
25	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Darlene, thank

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you very much.

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MS. BROWN: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Good job.

AGENDA ITEM NO. XIII

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item, the Bingo Director's report. Before LaDonna gives her report, we do have a public speaker, Steve Bresnen, who is here.

MR. BRESNEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Steve Bresnen on behalf of the Bingo Interest Group. I

don't want to prolong your meeting, but I do think

there are a couple things that should be brought to

your attention.

The first is the sales tax issue that we had with the Comptroller's Office. Just brief background, under the sales tax law, a number of nonprofits that are described by their 501(c) status in the Internal Revenue Code are exempt from paying sales tax. When you put five or six or seven charities in a unit, you may have some who are not tax exempt under the sales tax. Back in '06, the Comptroller's office issued a letter ruling that said that if you had, just as an example, if you had five charities there and four of them were exempt and one of them wasn't, then the unit would owe 20 percent of what would've otherwise been the sales tax on their purchases from

distributors. A contract auditor got it wrong and started auditing the number of the units and assessing them for sales tax.

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It came to my attention through a number of organizations that are involved in different groups, not just ours, and I made a call to the Comptroller's Office. I have long worked with Comptroller Glenn Hegar, both when he was in the legislature and at the Comptroller's Office, reached out to the Chief Deputy Comptroller and within a few hours, literally a few hours, she called me back and said, you're right, we'll fix it. In less than 24 hours, the information got out to the contract auditors, everything stopped.

One of the reasons that it stopped across the board for the 134 units that there are is because LaDonna and Vivian, her staff, quickly provided to the Comptroller's Office the information they needed to inform all of those units what the situation was, and to stand down, don't do anything.

Over the weekend, last weekend, I was at a birthday party for the venerable Don Bishop in Dallas, his 90th birthday party, and someone walked up to me and said if the Comptroller Hegar had not done that, it would've cost them \$160,000.

Another unit that I know of failed to

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respond to the audit notice, paid \$60,000, they're likely to get that money back filing a refund request, but at some point that might put them into not meeting their net proceeds requirements. So they're probably going to need a little slack.

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I don't represent those guys, but I'm going to send them a bill for letting y'all know about that.

But my point is this, it was inter-agency communication, Comptroller Hegar and his Chief Deputy Lisa Craven, did a fantastic job. They didn't let the bureaucracy get in the way. LaDonna and her staff took the same approach and there was a resolution that was promptly reached and information went out to the industry to take care of it.

That's the way it ought to work and we very much appreciate your staff for the role that they played in that.

A brief update on the implementation of Senate Bill 643. I've already spoken to you about the draft rules. Y'all may remember in a previous meeting I urged the industry to take it easy and be careful with their newfound authority. People wanted to be treated more like the market, and as y'all know, the market can be devastating to people.

I think it's fair to say and there may be an anecdote or two out there that I'm unaware of, but I think people have been acting judiciously with their newfound authority. On the same token, I'm hearing anecdotally that people are generating new sales and new customer attendance at some locations as they experiment with their new authority.

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So, I'm hoping -- several of us in the industry have decided we're going to get together and try to come up with some kind of tracking mechanism after the first full quarterly report (audio cuts out) those new laws. That concludes my comments (indiscernible).

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you. Okay.

Unless we have any other public speakers, LaDonna, your turn.

MS. CASTAÑUELA: Good morning,

Commissioners. I'm LaDonna Castañuela, Director,

Charitable Bingo Operations Division. In your notebook

materials, you have the Division's output metrics for

August and September of this year. Also included in

your notebooks and in compliance with Section 2001.560

of the Bingo Enabling Act, you will find the CBOD Audit

Services Department's FY2024 annual audit plan and risk

assessment. Statutory requirement is that the audit

plan is provided to you, but it is not an action item.

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That's all I have for you today, and I'm available to answer questions.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion? Okay. Well, LaDonna, as always, we're grateful for your stewardship at the helm and glad to hear your report, so good job.

AGENDA ITEM NO. XIV

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is the Executive Director report. Gary, this is your item.

MR. GRIEF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Other than what's in your notebooks this morning, I

wanted to share some industry news with you regarding
the two lottery organizations that Texas is involved
with.

First is NASPL, the North American
Association of State and Provincial Lotteries, of which
Texas is a very active member. Having held every
officer position in the NASPL organization over the
years, I've gladly not pursued any leadership role in
the organization for some time, but recently I was
asked to reconsider and subsequently, I was elected
earlier this month as the new Region IV Director, which
is responsible for facilitating communication and

collaboration with the lotteries from the southwestern portion of North America.

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Serving in that role has also placed me back on the NASPL Executive Committee, and we've got our next set of meetings coming up in Milwaukee at the annual NASPL conference at the end of this month. speaking of that NASPL conference, it's going to be held October 30th through November 2nd. members of our team are going to be in attendance at the conference in Milwaukee this year. There's going to be a number of meetings of the various lottery industry associations and game groups during the week. All the vendors in the lottery industry will be in attendance and participating in the traditional trade show setting. The NASPL awards are going to be presented in a number of different categories. during the week, I have the pleasure of moderating a panel consisting of representatives from the Green Bay Packers, Milwaukee Bucks, and Milwaukee Brewers to discuss fan loyalty, engagement, and how lotteries can best leverage sponsorship opportunities to maximize our return on investment and of course, our revenue to good causes.

Now, moving over to the Multi-State

Lottery Association, MUSL as it's known. This is the

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organization that manages the Powerball game and some other regional lottery games around the country, and of which Texas is a voting member. This organization has asked me to serve as the Mega Millions Game Chair, specifically to act as a liaison with the Mega Millions Consortium. As a reminder, Texas sells the Mega Millions game under an agreement with the Mega Millions Consortium, but we are not a voting member of that group.

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Again, having served in every capacity in MUSL over the years, this new role for me is unexpected and certainly not something I sought out. But the Mega Millions Consortium is considering changes to the Mega Millions game, and I've been asked to represent the interest of the 39 MUSL jurisdictions as we work through the complexities of any potential changes to a very important game in our portfolio.

A national steering committee has been formed. It's comprised of the lead director from the Mega Millions Consortium, representatives from each of the three vendors involved, IGT, Scientific Games, and Intralot, our executive director of MUSL, and me.

Various committees and subcommittees have also been formed to focus on this potential game change for Mega Millions, and I've secured important roles on those

committees for both Ryan Mindell, our Deputy Executive 1 2 Director, and Robert Tirloni, our Lottery Operations 3 Director. Meetings and discussions are ongoing and 4 the situation is very fluid right now. 5 I'll keep the 6 Commission informed as plans become firm. 7 Chairman, that concludes my remarks. I would be happy 8 to answer any questions. 9 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, 10 any comments, questions? 11 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Congratulations. 12 MR. GRIEF: Thank you. 1.3 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Yeah, indeed. 14 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Gary. Yes, 1.5 congratulations on your new roles. Although your role

is not necessarily part of what we do here on a day-to-day, but clearly, it shows your just expertise that you have and that the industry as a whole has sought out your particular set of knowledge and skills and history. And obviously you bring a lot to the table and it's something that the lottery is grateful for that we have that in-house.

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The other side is that you're able to see best practices nationally, regionally. You're able to have very in-depth discussions and be part of

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critical situations that otherwise we would potentially miss out on. And you're going to be able to bring back home the fruits of that labor. And particularly with your involvement with the Packers and Milwaukee and those professional organizations there to see best practices of what they're doing and how you can bring that back here to the State. So definitely a lot of upside to your involvement.

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So anyhow, just good job. And again, we're grateful to have your in-house expertise across the board, so good job.

AGENDA ITEM NO. XV

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item are enforcement cases. Bob, your item.

MR. BIARD: Morning, Commissioners. I'm Bob Biard, General Counsel. Item fifteen contains six lottery cases. There is a bingo case in here as well. The staff would like to pull Tab F, that's the bingo agreed order, because the respondent in that case unfortunately passed away since signing the agreement and I think the bingo division needs a little time to clarify who took his place.

All of these enforcement cases, of course, are cases where a lottery or bingo licensee violated a statute or rule. In most of these cases,

either the respondent failed to appear at the hearing and it proceeded by default, or the staff and the respondent reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order. And we have both these types of cases today.

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Tabs A through C are all non-sufficient funds lottery retailer license revocations. They're handled in a single order. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account. In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as default matter.

Tabs D and E are lottery agreed orders. In Tab D -- these materials are in your notebook -- a lottery retailer purchased a \$1,000 prize winning ticket from a customer, which is a violation. The penalty is a 30-day suspension. In Tab E, a lottery retailer required a \$30 minimum purchase when a player uses a debit card to buy lottery tickets. The penalty in that case is a 10-day suspension.

That concludes my presentation. And you may take these all up in a single vote if you like, and

I'm happy to answer any questions.
CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners,
is there a motion?
COMMISSIONER FRANZ: I'll move to accept
to approve the orders on these enforcement cases in
bulk?
CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Do we have a
second?
COMMISSIONER SAENZ: I second.
CHAIRMAN RIVERA: We do. Okay. All in
favor say aye.
(Chorus of "Ayes")
CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Good job.
MR. BIARD: Thank you, Commissioners.
And just to clarify, that was just Tabs A through E and
not F.
