CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Today is December the 14th. It is 10:00 a.m. We have all Commissioners here. We'll start with the Pledge of Allegiance.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Good morning again, everyone, excited to have so many folks here. Happy to announce that the Governor's reappointed Commissioner Fields to a new term with expires February of '29. So, congratulations, Cindy. Good job. We also have a new Commissioner on board. The Governor's appointed Clark Smith which a term that expires likewise in 2029. So, Clark, welcome and we're glad to have you on board.

COMMISSIONER SMITH: Well, honored to be here, honored to be appointed by Governor Abbott, and looking forward to working with my fellow Commissioners and with staff. This Sunset process that's already started is a fascinating and very important process. So, looking forward to, yeah, working with everybody. Thanks.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. We are back in session. It is 10:16. I would like to read a statement here. The Commission would like to ask Commissioner Fields to coordinate with the Commission staff on application of process for the executive director position. I therefore move that the Commission delegate Commissioner Fields the authority

to coordinate with the HR director and other Commission staff as they deem necessary without the need for further Commission discussion or action, to finalize the posting for executive director and post the position and to decide on the process to screen applicants, to conduct background investigations, to schedule interviews and other administrative matters related to the application process. Do I have a second?

COMMISSIONER FRANZ: I second that.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Good job. All in favor say aye.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Motion passes.

AGENDA ITEM NO. II

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. So, let's see here. Next item is a report on Commissioner training. Bob Biard, this is your item.

MR. BIARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman, Commissioners, I'm Bob Biard, General

Counsel. Whenever we have a new Lottery Commissioner,

this agency has a tradition of briefly reviewing the

laws that govern the Texas Lottery Commission at that

Commissioner's first open meeting. Also, since the

2013 Sunset legislation was enacted, the State Lottery

Act requires new appointees to complete a training program before they may deliberate, vote, or be counted as a member in attendance at a Commission meeting. The training must provide the appointee information regarding the legislation that created the Commission; the program, functions, and rules and budget of the Commission; the requirements of laws relating to open meetings, public information, administrative procedure, and conflicts of interest; and any applicable ethics policies adopted by the Commission or the Ethics Commission.

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And I wanted to say for the record that prior to this meeting, Commissioner Smith had the required training session to go over these items with Governmental Affairs Director Nelda Treviño, Controller Sergio Rey, Deputy Executive Director Ryan Mindell, and me. And for purposes of today's meeting, I just want to provide a very brief overview of some highlights regarding the ethics, procedural, and open government laws governing the Commission.

At the training session, I provided a document titled, A Guide to Ethics Laws for State

Officers and Employees. This is a Texas Ethics

Commission publication that was updated in 2022. And because the Lottery Commission has a number of more

specific requirements, we annotated it using blue ink to highlight provisions that are specific to the Lottery Commission.

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These lottery specific provisions are generally more restrictive than the requirements that apply to other state agencies. For instance, at this agency, there is a restriction against accepting employment or remuneration from a person that has a significant financial interest in the Lottery, which is a defined term in Chapter 467 of the Government Code, or on the Bingo side from a commercial lessor, distributor or manufacturer.

Also, with respect to gifts, while other agencies are subject to a de minimis exception that allows agency members and employees to accept gifts under \$50 in value, for instance, to cover the cost of a meal, at this agency, Lottery Commissioners and employees are prohibited from accepting any gift, which is defined to include anything of value, from a person that has a significant financial interest in the Lottery and certain persons associated with them, or a person who's won a lottery prize over \$600 within the last two years.

However, the Lottery Commission has an exception, and you may accept a gift that is given on

account of a relationship that's independent of your Commissioner status, which is something like kinship or a personal, professional or business relationship, which means that you know these people independently. In those cases, gifts are allowed. However, this agency does not have the authority to accept gifts. So, you cannot accept gifts on behalf of the Lottery Commission.

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There's also a restriction against certain political fundraising activities that's unique to this agency. A Lottery Commissioner may, and I'm quoting, may not directly or indirectly coerce, attempt to coerce, command, or advise a person to pay, lend, or contribute anything of value to another person for political purposes. That's the end of the quote. There are two attorney general opinions that discuss this provision, which applies just to the Lottery Commission, and I provided those to you.

This restriction does not necessarily prevent you personally or individually from donating to political candidates or causes. Next, with respect to procedural laws under the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission has two key roles. First, to propose and adopt rules related to the Lottery and Charitable Bingo. And second, to decide contested cases involving

specific licensees.

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Rules are general statements of policy or practice that are generally applicable to all persons. When you propose rules, you're acting in a legislative-type capacity, and you may talk to anyone you wish in connection with rule proposals. However, you also have a judicial type of function because you decide contested cases where the legal rights and duties of particular licensees are determined after an opportunity for hearing.

At the Lottery Commission, contested cases usually involve a lottery or bingo licensee, and the issue is usually whether to deny, suspend, or revoke a license; and, on the bingo side only, to assess monetary penalties for violations of the agency's governing statutes or rules; or, you also approve settlements.

As the rest of you know, this agency negotiates a number of contested case settlements presented to the board in the form of agreed orders. In contested cases, ex parte communications are prohibited, which means you may not communicate with any person or party to the case about an issue of law or facts unless all parties have been notified and have the opportunity to participate. There is an exception

to this prohibition that allows you to communicate with agency staff members that have not participated in the case to use the agency's special skills or knowledge in evaluating the evidence.

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Now the cases are heard at the State

Office of Administrative hearings, which we call SOAH,

by an independent administrative law judge who prepares

the proposal for your consideration. Although the

proposal is only a recommendation, the law protects the

impartial role of the judge by limiting the reasons why

the Commission may change the judge's recommendations.

And there are three reasons. These are to correct a technical error such as a wrong name, address, date, or an uncontested fact. Two, if the judge fails to properly apply the law, agency rules, policies, or prior agency decisions. Or three, if the Commission decides to overrule a prior agency decision relied on by the judge because it's incorrect, or the Commission has decided it should be changed.

I want to briefly touch on additional required training. A new Commissioner is required to complete the Attorney General's online training on the Open Meetings Act and Public Information Act within 90 days of taking the oath of office. And in this case, Commissioner Smith, I believe you have until February

27th of 2024 to complete those sessions. And there are two certificates you will need to print from the Attorney General's website when you complete the online training and the agency's required to maintain those on file. So, you can give those to me when you've completed the training. Commissioner Smith and I discussed the Open Meetings Act and Public Information Act, and I won't go into any more detail on those here.

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There's also a separate required webinar training course on contract management for governmental boards that's conducted by the Comptroller's Office.

And we found out now for the first time, they have started charging \$25 to take that webinar. So, you will need to complete that soon, but there is no deadline associated with that training.

And last, I will note that because the Lottery Commission is a five-member board, three Commissioners are required for a quorum, and there must be at least three Commissioners present to conduct business at an open meeting. This also means two Commissioners can meet and discuss public information - public business, excuse me, without violating the Act, but there's an important caveat to that. The Attorney General and the Texas Courts have said it would be a violation of the Open Meetings Act to

deliberately have a series of two Commissioner meetings with different Commissioners in order to decide a matter of public business outside of an open meeting. That's referred to as a walking quorum, and it's not allowed. But whether you are circumventing the Act is always a question of intent, and that's always going to be a fact question involving a specific factual inquiry.

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Commissioners, this has been a very high level overview of some of the topics we covered with Commissioner Smith. There's a lot of information in the laws governing the Commission and state government. So, please always feel free to contact me if you ever have any questions about any of these laws or how they apply. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Bob. Thank you and thank you for your transparency. Commissioners, any questions?

# AGENDA ITEM NO. III

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item is a report from the Bingo Advisory Committee. Trace, this is your item.

MR. SMITH: Good morning, Commissioners, Chairman. Commissioner Fields, good to see you again. Commissioner Smith, congratulations on your appointment

and my condolences as well.

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COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you.

MR. SMITH: You're welcome, sir.

This past Tuesday, December 12th, the Bingo Advisory Committee had their last meeting of the year. The Bingo Advisory Committee wishes to support the rules package that staff will present later in this meeting. It deals with the updates pertaining to the legislative session that we just had.

The BAC also is preparing for the upcoming rule review process by creating a rules committee. The committee will be comprised of not only Bingo Advisory Committee members, but members of the industry as well. We expect to meet sometime in late January to start the process of review before the next Bingo Advisory Committee meeting on the 31st of January.

We also had one of our esteemed Bingo
Advisory Committee members retire; Emile Bourgoyne.

Emile was a valuable resource that we will surely miss.

Emile announced his retirement a couple months back, so
staff have been going through the replacement process
and provided the Bingo Advisory Committee with the
applications that were submitted.

The Bingo Advisory Committee unanimously

1	supports Floyd Olive to replace Emile. Floyd has been
2	in the bingo industry for many years doing all jobs in
3	the hall and moving up his way in the industry to now
4	working as a manufacturer's representative. We, the
5	BAC, ask that you approve Floyd for the manufacturer
6	position within the BAC.
7	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay?
8	MR. BIARD: That requires a vote
9	excuse me, that requires a vote.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is adoption of Bingo Rule changes. Tyler, your item.

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MR. VANCE: Morning Chairman,
Commissioners. I apologize, I'm going to read from my
phone. This is obviously quite lengthy here. I have
for your consideration today the possible adoption of
amendments to Bingo Rules 402.200, .203, .400, .401,
.404, .405, .413, .420, .451, .452, .503, .600, .706,
and .707. As Trace has mentioned, all these rules are
being amended to comply with recent legislation,
specifically House Bill 639, Senate Bill 643, and
Senate Bill 422.

There are a lot of changes in these that are all included in your memo. Main highlights are a doubling of the occasion prize limit from 2,500 to 5,000, doubling of temporary licenses for both regular licensees and non-regular licensees. We've got a doubling of the net proceeds period. It used to be on a one-year basis. Now it's on a two-year basis. There's an allowance for military members to operate in bingo without a license as long as they're stationed here, provided that they're licensed in another state in good standing that has similar rules.

16	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Next item, report on
17	lottery sales and revenue. Sergio and Will, your item.
18	MR. REY: Good morning, Commissioners.
19	For the record, my name is Sergio Rey, Controller for
20	the Texas Lottery. This morning Will Russ, the
21	Products Manager, and I, will present to you the sales
22	and game performance of lottery draw and scratch
23	tickets through December 2, 2023.
24	Due to technical issues, we have
25	provided a copy of the slide show on the dais for you.

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So, before you is a graph comparing year to date from December 1, 2022 and now December 2023.

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Current year to date sales total through the period was \$2,106,097,650. This is a 5 percent decrease from last year. Last fall, we had the record breaking \$1.9-billion Powerball, which gave us a good sales boost. Although we did have a great run earlier this October, it did not provide the same results like in 2022.

Draw games represented here in blue illustrate the 11.6 percent drop from last year's total of 549.9-million to 486.4-million this year. The scratch tickets though have recently had an increase in sales, which is done in orange. The scratch sales decreased by \$53-million. Our last year was 1.673-billion to this year's 1.619-billion. The last two weeks in this reporting period provided some leveling to maintain a decrease at just over 3 percent.

For the next slide, Will Russ will provide more details on the games during this time period.

MR. RUSS: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. Good morning, Commissioners. For the record, I'm Will Russ, the Products Manager, and will be giving a more detailed view of the sales that Sergio just reported

on.

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on the bottom right corner, you can see the year-over-year decline of 117-million. The overwhelming majority of that is due to Powerball and scratch sales. As you all know, we're up against a very tough year for jackpots, and at this point our biggest challenge is Powerball. You can see the deficit of almost 52-million in white at the top of the slide.

When considering this, it's important to remember Powerball hit an advertised 1.9-billion last November, November of '22 as Sergio just mentioned. This was and still is, the world's highest jackpot. In better news, however, we are on a solid Powerball run, and the jackpot right now is 535-million.

Continuing with the national jackpot games, you'll notice that Mega Millions is down a less significant 10.3-million. This is also somewhat expected, given that by this time last year, Mega had two runs of approximately 600-million.

Lotto is holding even, which is great news. The Extra! feature is up, and we're very pleased with its steady increase in popularity. The jackpot right now is at an impressive 30-million, and it's been growing for weeks. We'll continue to monitor it and

hope for another large jackpot like we saw last April.

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Finally, Texas Two Step is up slightly as well. In the middle of the slide in blue are the daily games, and the same trends are continuing. Daily 4, Cash 5, and All or Nothing are all slightly up.

Pick 3 has a very minor decline, but as mentioned in previous meetings, we believe our Pick 3 players are moving to Daily 4.

Although the Draw Games portion of the portfolio is down about 65-million, the last four weeks have been up and the toughest comp week of the year is behind us. There are still challenging weeks ahead, though, as last year was historic for large jackpots. We'll keep an eye out on the current Powerball and Lotto jackpots and do what we can to capitalize on sales from those rolls.

As I previously mentioned, scratch sales are down about 53-million or 3.19 percent. We know from our vendor partners and lottery industry press that Texas is not alone in this deficit. Other states around the country are also experiencing this decline year-over-year.

On a better note, the last three weeks of scratch sales have been positive and we have had some exciting launches. On Monday, December 4th, we

launched the \$20 \$1,000,000 Cash Blast scratch ticket game, and partnered with the company Space Perspective on its second-chance prize. Four lucky winners and their guests will enjoy a flight to the edge of space on Space Perspective's Neptune Capsule. The launch of this game has garnered press from around the state and even a national story. Sales for the first several days are promising, and a sample ticket is included for each of you on the dais.

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In response to the scratch sales deficit of the first quarter, we made some changes to the game launch schedule. The most significant of those changes is the addition of another \$100 game that will launch in February. The prize structure for this game is different than the other \$100 games currently in market, and we believe this diversification will appeal to our higher price point players. I will bring a sample ticket to the February Commission meeting.

Finally, our largest promotional event of the year is at the State Fair of Texas, which ended on October 22nd. The Texas Lottery had another successful year with its record breaking sales of \$2,061,313.

We're very proud of the promotions team, our vendor and retail partners, and their success generating revenue for our beneficiaries. With that, I'll wrap up.

16	Foundation School Fund, and the Texas Veterans
17	Commission for the period ending October 31, 2023.
18	For the first two months of the year, our
19	total accrued revenues were \$289.2-million with
20	286.2-million for the Foundation School Fund and just
21	over 3-million for the Texas Veterans Commission. That
22	is \$9-million more than last year at this time.
23	Our collective transfers to the
24	Foundation School Fund continue to grow, now totaling
25	to \$32.1-billion and cumulative transfers to the State

at \$38.1-billion. And with that, this concludes my presentation.

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion? All right. Thank you very much, Sergio.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. Next item, report on agency Sunset Review. Ryan, your item.

MR. MINDELL: Good morning, Chairman, Commissioners. For the record, my name is Ryan Mindell, Deputy Executive Director. I just have a brief update for you on Sunset. Just a reminder of where we are in the process.

We finished our self-evaluation report over the summer. Staff began their review. We've been working very closely with Sunset staff for the past few weeks, provided them information, meetings with our vendors and with us across the agency and provided them all the information they need for this step of the process. Obviously, this will continue with the staff review process until the spring, at which point the Sunset review will transition more into the public hearing and with the Sunset Commission process.

So again, just a very brief update to let you know that everything is going smoothly so far.

Also, I'm happy to report that we don't have any findings in that area and I'll bring the full report to you in the next session.

We're also looking at the scratch ticket contract procurement status and we anticipate that will be completed prior to the next meeting (indiscernible).

Finally, we anticipate that we will begin our client's 1 2 payment management audit in January, and I will provide 3 an update in the next meeting. That concludes my report for today, but I'll be happy to answer any 4 questions. 5 6 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Darlene, good job. 7 Thank you very much. 8 COMMISSIONER STEEN: Thank you.

MS. CASTAÑUELA: Good morning,

Commissioners and welcome, Commissioner Smith.

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For the record, I'm LaDonna Castañuela,
Director of Charitable Bingo Operations Division.

Information regarding output metrics for CBOD for
October and November can be found in your notebook
materials.

As we close out the calendar year, I want to let you know that CBOD is more fully staffed right now than it has been since well before I got here in July of 2021. We are 86 percent staffed with just four vacancies, and in fact, if you know anyone who is interested in an auditor position in the DFW or San

Antonio areas, please let me know.

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The division's current staffing includes several new employees who are bringing new energy to our operations and several others in the field and at headquarters who bring the tremendous value of their 10 to 20 plus years of bingo industry history and experience. We have several ongoing projects, including continuing to work with industry to increase use of our online portal and to reduce paper filings of quarterly reports and applications. Earlier this year we posted detailed how-to manuals online and continue sending quarterly reminders by email, including links to the required forms and the how-to manuals.

Like Ryan mentioned, we've been preparing numerous responses and data for our Sunset review, and also attending a number of meetings and demonstrations, including visits to bingo halls and a couple of onsite game inspections in November. Next month we will conduct what we expect to be a marathon meeting with the BAC's rules review committee as part of the rules review process.

of service to the committee and to the Commission, and

especially for always being willing to share his

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February. Gary obviously is incredibly important to all that we do here at the Lottery. But he will be here in essence, another quarter of a year. And so, he is at the helm, will remain there until the absolute end of February and we're absolutely going to utilize every penny of his paycheck as he'll be earning it through the end of the month of February.

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So, with that, we know that we have a duty ahead of us. The Commissioners are in the process of an executive director search. Cindy is going to, as I mentioned earlier, going to be the point person for the Commissioners and working with Jan and Lottery staff and the Governor's Office. We will be moving forward and we will keep you up to date from the dais. And who knows? Maybe we'll have an announcement prior the end of February.

So, with that again, Gary remains at the helm, will be, and everyone's day-to-day duties, responsibilities, they remain the same. This is a huge opportunity ahead for Lottery, particularly for every employee regardless of tenure, because of the directives and work ethic and vision and standard that Gary has set. So, all of that remains into effect now and always. So, with that Gary, we look forward to the next several months here with you.

So, just wanted to pass that along from the dais.

CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item. We have enforcement cases, Bob.

MR. BIARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Again, I'm Bob Biard, General Counsel. Item 11

contains 15 cases, 12 lottery cases, and 3 bingo cases,

Tabs A through O. These are cases where a lottery or

bingo licensee or registrant has violated a statute or

rule or an applicant did not qualify for a license. In

most of these cases, either the Respondent failed to

appear at the hearing and it proceeded by default, or

the staff and the Respondent reached a settlement in

the form of an agreed order. We have both of these

types of cases today, as well as several cases that

were at the State Office of Administrative Hearings on

a litigated basis.

Tabs A through D are all the non-sufficient fund lottery retailer license revocations handled in a single order. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the

Commission's account. In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

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Tabs E through I are lottery agreed orders. The materials have been provided to you. I believe all five of these relate to debit card violations.

Tabs M through O -- or no, tabs J through L. These are non-sufficient fund cases that went to hearing because the retailer did appear and did not settle. In each one of these cases, the administrative law judge recommended revoking the lottery license, and none of the respondents in these cases filed exceptions to the recommendation.

Finally, Tabs M through O are bingo agreed orders. Tab M is an accounting case involving the VFW Post 3966 Devine. This case involves a variety of accounting and reporting errors.

Tabs N and O are bingo worker settlements. These are cases where the applicant had been either convicted of a crime, a disqualifying crime, or I think one of these cases involved a deferred adjudication. And the settlement is to allow these people to serve as a bingo worker on a restricted

1	basis, (indiscernible) to register I think, on, on
2	transactions, on compliance with the Charitable Bingo
3	rules, but they may sell and deliver prize money, sell
4	bingo cards, pull-tabs, work as an usher.
5	That concludes my presentation. You may
6	take up the enforcement orders in a single vote if you
7	like and I'll also be happy to answer any questions.
