3	AGENDA ITEM I.
4	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Good morning, everyone. I'd like to call
5	this meeting of the Texas Lottery Commission to order. Today is April
6	the 29th. It is 10:00 a.m. We have a quorum. Commissioner Franz should
7	be here shortly. We will start with the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S.
8	and Texas flags.
9	(Pledges recited. Commissioner Franz arrived.)
10	AGENDA ITEM II.
11	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. First item is a report from the Bingo
12	Advisory Committee. Trace Smith, this is your item.
13	MR. SMITH: Morning, Chairman Rivera, Bingo Commissioner
14	Fields, and Commissioners. Yesterday, the BAC met to discuss several
15	items of which the two main items were bills in the Legislature that
16	would affect bingo and a recent bingo advisory opinion request. The BAC
17	decided to form a subcommittee to gather facts for the public comment
18	period on how the request would affect the charitable bingo industry.
19	The subcommittee will have its findings into the staff no
20	later than the 20th of May. Also, I would like to thank Chairman Rivera,
21	Bingo Commissioner Fields, and the other Commissioners for helping the
22	charitable bingo industry, the BAC, and the charities that conduct bingo
23	in the State of Texas. We would also like to thank LaDonna and Tyler and
24	the rest of the staff for the work they have put into not only the
25	industry, but the countless hours for the BAC. That concludes my report.
26	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Commissioners, any questions?

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1	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: I have a quick comment. I'd like to thank
2	you guys for your service to your industry and for being advisors to the
3	Commission and you especially for your excellent continuing leadership
4	of the BAC.
5	MR. SMITH: Thank you.
6	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: And taking the time to testify before
7	various legislative bodies. I hope it helps charitable bingo in Texas.
8	MR. SMITH: I think it will.
9	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Trace, thank you so much.
10	MR. SMITH: Thank you.
11	AGENDA ITEM III.
12	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you. Okay, next item is adoption of
13	the courier rule changes. Bob Biard, you're up.
14	MR. REY: Mr. Chairman, if I may.
15	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Sure.
16	MR. REY: Thank you, Chairman. For the record, Sergio Rey,
17	Acting Deputy Executive Director. Before we begin, I'd like to provide
18	a simplified chronology of events leading to this rule amendment before
19	the Commission board.
20	On February 24th, the executive director at the time issued
21	a policy statement accounting that lottery ticket courier services were
22	not allowed under Texas law and that the agency will move forward with
23	proposed rule amendments to align with state law and legislative efforts
24	to address the serious concerns from players and state leadership.
25	Prior to and following the policy statement, self-reported
26	retailers were - with affiliation with lottery courier services had

compliance inspections from our Enforcement Division. Any violations from existing administrative rule have been followed up on through administrative procedures.

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Now, following the Commission meeting on March the 4th, a subsequent 30-day public comment period with a hearing on April 3<sup>rd</sup>, today we bring forth the final rule amendment for your consideration and yes, Bob Biard, our general counsel, will now present that final rule amendment.

9 MR. BIARD: Thank you, Sergio. Commissioners, I'm Bob Biard, 10 General Counsel. Staff recommends adoption of the amendments to three 11 lottery rules: Rules 401.158, 401.160, and 401.355, that would require 12 the Commission to revoke the lottery ticket sales agent license of a 13 retailer that works in concert with the courier, whether under a common 14 ownership arrangement or otherwise. The Commission approved publication 15 of the amendments at the March 4th meeting.

16 Two entities provided written comments to the proposal and 17 those same commenters and one other provided oral comments at the public 18 comment hearing on April 3rd. Comments in support of the proposal were 19 provided by the Texas Food and Fuel Association, which represents the 20 wholesale and retail levels of the food and petroleum industries in Texas 21 and whose members own, operate, or supply more than 16,500 retail 22 convenience stores in Texas.

Comments opposed to the proposal were provided by the Coalition of Texas Lottery Couriers comprised of couriers Jackpocket, Jackpot.com, and Lotto.com. As required by the Administrative Procedure Act, the preamble to the proposed adopted amendments includes the

1 agency's response to these comments. Staff recommends adoption of the 2 amendments.

3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Do we have any speakers?
4 MR. BIARD: We do not have anyone signed up for public comment.
5 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Commissioners, any discussion? Any
6 questions?

7 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Mr. Chairman, I just would like to make 8 one comment. You'll recall--

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CHAIRMAN RIVERA: --Is your light?

10 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: --Yeah, it's on green. You'll recall I 11 voted against the initial promulgation of this rule back on March 4th for the reason being, at that time that I did believe that the actions 12 13 we had taken regarding bulk purchasing, you'll recall limiting the number 14 of terminals and some of those policies that we had taken, addressed 15 that which was the pressing need at the time, and that we would be better 16 served to wait until we heard from the Legislature on details of what 17 they were proposing. As we know, there's a lot of legislation out there 18 on this issue right now.

However, I have, during this 30-day period and weighing the evidence and all, I'm persuaded that this is the right move to go forward and that we should do the maximum amount allowable under our current statute, which is what this does in my understanding, and then we should proceed with that. And then when we see what the Legislature produces, we'll then be back here to fine-tune that whichever direction they go.

25 So, I just want to clarify that from that previous vote, and 26 I'll be voting in favor.

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1	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Mark, thank you for your comments. Any
2	additional comments, questions?
3	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: I have one question for Bob. Bob, if the
4	Legislature were to come to an agreement and decide to regulate the
5	couriers, what happens to this rule? It doesn't just go away, right? The
6	Commission needs to take immediate action to
7	MR. BIARD: There would be an effective date for the new law
8	and the Commission would likely be required to adopt rules to implement
9	the new law in which event these changes being made now would be repealed
10	or modified to conform to the new law.
11	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Okay. Thank you.
12	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Commissioners, any other discussion?
13	Okay. Is there a motion to adopt the rule changes?
14	MR. STEEN: So moved.
15	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Do we have a second?
16	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Second.
17	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. All in favor say "aye."
18	(Chorus of "Ayes")
19	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Motion passes. Next item is appointing
20	go ahead, Sergio.
21	MR. REY: Yes, apologies. If I may, now that the rule amendment
22	has been approved, the agency will commence with appropriate
23	administrative processes, whether it relates to investigations or
24	respond to any violations within due process. So, John Graham, our
25	Enforcement director, is available to provide any details of this process
26	if you so please.

1	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any additional
2	discussion questions? Okay, Sergio, we appreciate it and grateful for
3	the work that you are doing, have done, and will do, Bob and John, as
4	well. Thank you.
5	AGENDA ITEM IV.
6	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is appointing a Commissioner
7	to the Legal Subcommittee. Bob, this is your item.
8	MR. BIARD: Thank you. Thank you, Commissioners. With the
9	recent departure of Commissioner Smith, there's now a vacancy on the
10	Legal Subcommittee. After discussion with the Chairman and Commissioner
11	Franz, we recommend that you as a board take action to appoint
12	Commissioner Franz to serve on the Legal Subcommittee with the Chairman.
13	Happy to answer any questions.
14	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Any questions, comments? Okay. Is there a
15	motion to appoint Commissioner Franz to the Legal Subcommittee?
16	COMMSSIONER STEEN: So moved.
17	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Do we have a second?
18	COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Second.
19	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. All in favor say "aye."
20	(Chorus of "Ayes")
21	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Motion passes. Commissioner Franz, welcome
22	to the Legal Subcommittee.
23	AGENDA ITEM V.
24	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Alrighty. Next item is a report on HUB and
25	minority business participation. Eric Williams, this is your item.

MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning, Chairman, Commissioners. For the record, my name is Eric Williams, and I am the Historically Underutilized Business Program Coordinator of the HUB program. As you're aware, the HUB program is a statewide initiative that provides assistance in contracting opportunities to minority, women, and service-disabled veteran-owned businesses. I'd like to provide a brief update on our program before I speak about the Minority Business Participation Report.

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At the beginning of each fiscal year, the agency sets its 8 annual internal HUB goals as required by the Comptroller's rules. This 9 10 year's goals and a set of summary reports were sent to you last fall. A copy of the agency's finalized fiscal year 2024 Minority Business 11 Participation Report is included in your notebooks this morning. This 12 13 is an annual report which is required by Section 466.107 of the State Lottery Act and must be made available to the Governor, Lieutenant 14 15 Governor, Speaker of the House, and members of the Legislature.

16 The report documents minority and HUB participation in our agency's contracting activities and includes information on the number 17 18 of licensed minority retailers. Through fiscal year 2024, the agency received an overall participation rate of 10.72% in its minority HUB 19 contracting activities, which is an increase from our fiscal year 2023's 20 21 performance of 9.63%. Of the 22 largest spending state agencies and 22 universities, in fiscal year 2024, the agency ranked 15th by overall HUB 23 percentage.

During this reporting period, the agency also had 8,931 minority retailers, which represented 41.69% of the Texas Lottery's total

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1	retailer base. I'll be happy to answer any questions regarding this
2	report at this time.
3	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Eric, thank you. Commissioners any
4	discussion? Thank you very much, Eric.
5	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. Thank you.
6	COMMISSIONER FRANZ: No, thank you, Eric. Also, for pointing
7	out on the number of retailers that we've gotten, 40% is a good number.
8	That's a little bit different for our agency than a lot of agencies
9	because we have so many external agents in our circle.
10	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
11	COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thank you.
12	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
13	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Is there a motion to approve?
14	COMMISSIONER FRANZ: I'll move to approve.
15	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay.
16	COMMISSIONER STEEN: Second.
17	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Motion and a second. All in favor say "aye."
18	(Chorus of "Ayes")
19	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Motion passes. Eric, thank you so much for
20	your hard work and just we are very grateful.
21	MR. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. Thank you, Chairman.
22	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you.
23	AGENDA ITEM VI.
24	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is a report on lottery
25	operations procurement. Angela?

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1	MS. ZGABAY-ZGARBA: Good morning, Chairman, Commissioners. For
2	the record, my name is Angela Zgabay-Zgarba, the Director of
3	Administration. Item six in your notebook is a briefing item. This is
4	an interim status update to let you know that the RFP continues to
5	progress as planned and under review.
6	I'd be happy to answer any questions or if you have any
7	comments or questions.
8	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion,
9	comments, questions?
10	Angela, thank you very much. We appreciate the work that you
11	do.
12	AGENDA ITEM VII.
13	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is a report on lottery sales,
14	revenue transfers, and agency financials. Sergio, your item.
15	MR. REY: Well, thank you, Chairman again. For the record,
16	Sergio Rey, Acting Deputy Executive Director. Well, this morning we have
17	a new format of our previous three financial agenda items, and they have
18	now been consolidated to one report. Specifically, the product line
19	details, we have already reviewed and discussed with our Planning
20	Subcommittee. Annika Guarnero, our financial operations manager, will
21	be making today's presentation.
22	MS. GUARNERO: Good morning. For the record, my name is Annika
23	Guarnero, Financial Operations Manager in the Office of the Controller.
24	Next slide, please. Thank you.
25	The first item we'll cover will be sales through week ending
26	April 9, 2025. At the 33-week mark of fiscal year 2025, we have reached

total sales of \$5.16-billion. This is a decrease of roughly \$323-million or 5.9% from last year's \$5.48-billion for the same time period. Draw sales are reflecting a decrease of approximately \$235-million less than last year. This year's total is \$978.6-million versus the \$1.213-billion last year. Scratch ticket sales noted in the orange bars encompass 81% of sales through week 33. The \$4.176-billion total is about \$88-million less than last year.

8 For our second part of our agenda item, I'll be presenting a 9 high-level summary of the accrued revenues and transfers to the State 10 through March 31, 2025. Next slide, please. Thank you.

Our accrued revenue transfers to the State totaled \$949million for the first seven months of fiscal year 2025. Of this amount transferred to the State from sales, \$887-million were transferred to the Foundation School Fund.

On our next slide, this slide shows that \$17.3 million were transferred to the Texas Veterans Commission. The remaining \$44.3million were transferred from unclaimed prizes. While the overall amount of transfers is less than compared to this time last fiscal year, our next slide shows our cumulative accrued transfers through March 2025 to the Texas education is \$34.7-billion and \$267.9-million to Texas Veterans. Next slide, please.

The third part of this agenda item is the budget summary through the second quarter of fiscal year 2025, ending February 28, 2025. We provided this detailed data in your notebooks. Next slide, please.

25 Of the total funding appropriated by the Legislature to the 26 Commission, \$336-million is for the lottery account budget. Through the

second quarter, 76.8% or \$258.3-million of this budget has either been 1 2 expended or encumbered. 3 Our next slide shows that the Bingo operating budget is \$2.5-4 million, which is funded through general revenue. Through the second quarter, 89.8% or \$2.3-million of this budget has either been expended 5 6 or encumbered. Overall, these percentages align with previous fiscal years and reflect our ongoing commitment to responsible stewardship of 7 state funds. This concludes my presentation of agenda item seven. 8 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, great presentation. Thank 9 you. 10 Commissioners, any questions? Discussion? 11 Thank you very much. Good job. 12 AGENDA ITEM VIII. 13 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is report on the legislative 14 session. Nelda, your item. 15 MS. TREVIÑO: Good morning, Commissioners. For the record, I'm Nelda Treviño. I'm the Director of Governmental Affairs. We have provided 16 17 you an updated bill tracking report this morning and I have a high-level 18 summary and some brief comments regarding a few bills. 19 Senate Bill 1, the General Appropriations Bill by Senator Joan Huffman and Representative Greg Bonnen outlines the State budget 20 for the 2026-2027 biennium. The appointed Conference Committee comprised 21 22 of five House members and five Senate members is meeting to resolve the 23 differences between the House and Senate versions. 24 As you are aware, the House version of the Appropriations 25 Bill zeros out the agency's budget and the Senate version maintains the 26 agency's funding, and also adds two new riders related to the lottery

reporting requirements. The Conference Committee will adopt a final budget to be presented to the House and to the Senate for a final vote.

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House Bill 500 by Representative Bonnen is the supplemental appropriations bill. This bill was voted out of the House, and it is anticipated to be considered by the Senate Finance Committee. The bill 5 as voted out of the House includes the agency's two IT exceptional items: 6 7 requests for the Bingo Operating Service System and for the agency's CAPPS financial system. 8

Senate Bill 28 by Senator Bob Hall relates to the prohibition 9 10 of lottery couriers. The bill was voted out of the Senate on February 11 the 27th and is pending consideration by the House.

Senate Bill 1346 by Senator Brian Hughes relates to the 12 13 prohibition of bulk purchases for lottery tickets. This bill was voted 14 out of the Senate on April the 10th and is pending consideration by the 15 House.

16 House Bill 4172 by Representative Senfronia Thompson relates to the regulation of charitable bingo. This bill was considered by the 17 18 House Licensing and Administrative Procedures Committee and a committee 19 substitute was voted out favorably from the Committee. Provisions of the bill include authorizing the establishment of a nonprofit corporation 20 21 and a mechanism to advertise and promote charitable bingo; allowing the return of bingo products to licensed distributors under certain 22 circumstances; increasing the prize amount exempt from prize fees from 23 24 \$5 to \$100; and increasing the amount a licensed charity can maintain 25 and reserve for capital allowances from 50,000 to a 100,000.

House Bill 2820 by Representative AJ Louderback also relates to the regulation of charitable bingo. This bill was also considered by the House Licensing and Administrative Procedures Committee, and a committee substitute was also voted out favorably from the Committee. This bill increases the amount a licensed charity can maintain and reserve for capital allowances from 50,000 to 100,000. It is anticipated these two bills related to charitable bingo will now be considered by the full House.

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Senate Bill 1721 by Senator Mayes Middleton relates to the 9 10 transfer of the regulation of charitable bingo to the Texas Department 11 of Licensing and Regulation. The bill was considered by the Senate State Affairs Committee and a committee substitute was voted out favorably 12 13 from the Committee. This bill is now scheduled to be considered on May 1st by the Senate under its local and uncontested calendar. The committee 14 15 substitute for Senate Bill 1721 requires the transfer of the bingo 16 program to occur by September 1, 2026.

The agency's Sunset Legislation, Senate Bill 2404, by Senator
Middleton, and its House Companion, House Bill 1505, by Representative
Lacey Hull have not been considered by the committees.

In closing, the regular legislative session will conclude on Monday, June 2nd. Beginning May 12th, legislative deadlines for action under House and Senate rules will begin coming into effect in order for bills to continue through the legislative process. We will continue monitoring legislation through the end of the session, identify bills that are enacted impacting the agency, and will begin preparing for the legislative implementation project.

19 This concludes my report, and I'll be glad to answer any 1 2 questions. 3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Nelda, thank you. Commissioners, any 4 questions, any discussion? 5 COMMISSIONER STEEN: Thank you, Nelda. COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thanks, Nelda. Busy time. 6 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you, Nelda. MS. TREVIÑO: You're welcome. 8 AGENDA ITEM IX. 9 10 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Next item is the internal auditor's 11 report. Darlene? 12 MS. BROWN: Good morning, Commissioners. For the record, I'm 13 Darlene Brown, the Internal Auditor. I have a short report for you today. 14 Our team has been very busy. We've issued out the advertising 15 program audit report, and those controls were generally effective. We also completed the claims and price management audit and concluded that 16 17 controls are generally effective there. We are in the middle of the 18 budget audit. We completed the quarterly network access reviews and had 19 no issues. We've also begun looking at the lottery contractor RFP process 20 to make sure that those were followed, and we will soon start the drawing 21 studio audit. And then later on this month in May, we will look at the 22 IT software system life cycle. 23 That concludes my report for today. 24 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, Darlene, thank you. Commissioners, any 25 discussion? We are very grateful for all of your detailed work, and it's 26 definitely noted and we're grateful. Darlene, thank you.

2	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Welcome back.
3	AGENDA ITEM X.
4	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay, next item is the Bingo Director's
5	report. LaDonna, your item.
6	MS. CASTAÑUELA: Good morning, Commissioners. For the record,
7	LaDonna Castañuela, Director, Charitable Bingo Operations Division. In
8	your notebooks, you have the Division's output metric reports for
9	February and March. I'm available to answer any questions you may have.
10	That's all I have for you this morning.
11	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion?
12	COMMISSIONER STEEN: Thanks, LaDonna.
13	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Thank you. Bob, do you want to say something?
14	AGENDA ITEM XI.
15	MR. BIARD: Sure. Yes, Chairman. On Item 11, this is the
16	Executive Director report. This agenda item was prepared by the former
17	Executive Director who's no longer with the agency. My understanding is
18	this item is tabled and won't be taken up today.
19	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Okay, so next item.
20	MR. BIARD: The enforcement cases.
21	AGENDA ITEM XII.
22	CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Enforcement cases. 12. Bob, your item.
23	MR. BIARD: Yes. Commissioner, again, I'm Bob Biard, General
24	Counsel. This item contains 24 lottery cases, tabs A through X. These
25	are cases where a lottery or bingo licensee violated a statute or rule.
26	In most cases, either the respondent failed to appear at the hearing,

and it proceeds by default, or the staff and the respondent reached a settlement in the form of an agreed order. We have both of these types of cases today. These are all lottery cases today, as well as one case that did go to the State Office of Administrative Hearings.

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Tabs A through N are the non-sufficient fund lottery retailer license revocations handled in a single order. Each case was presented at the State Office of Administrative Hearings for revocation of the retailer license because the licensee failed to have sufficient funds in their bank account to cover electronic fund transfers to the Commission's account. In each case, the licensee failed to appear at the hearing, and the judge remanded the case to the Commission to handle as a default matter.

13 Tabs O through W are lottery agreed orders, and we have a variety of violations in those. These are settlements. 14

15 And finally, tab X is a SOAH case. A retailer requested a 16 redetermination of the amount that the Commission determined was owed following a flooding incident in which tickets were stolen and validated. 17 18 The judge recommended in favor of the Commission that the retailer must 19 pay the amount that the Commission determined was owed.

20 That concludes my presentation. I recommend approval of all 21 these orders, and you may take them up in a single vote if you like.

22 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Bob, thank you. Commissioners, any 23 discussion?

24 Okay. Is there a motion to approve the orders, tabs A through Х. 25 26

COMMSSIONER STEEN: So moved.

22 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: We have a motion. Is there a second? 1 2 COMMSSIONER FIELDS: Second. 3 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Motion is seconded. All in favor say "aye." BIARD: We have no request for public comment. 10 AGENDA ITEM XIV. 11 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. I move that the Texas Lottery 12 Commission go into executive session to deliberate personnel matters and 13 to receive legal advice. Is there a second? COMMISSIONER STEEN: So moved. 14 15 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: We have a second. All in favor say "aye." 16 (Chorus of "Ayes") 17 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: The Texas Lottery Commission will go into executive session at 10:27 a.m. on April 29, 2025. 18 19 AGENDA ITEM XV. 20 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. The Texas Lottery Commission is out of 21 executive session at 11:01 a.m. We have some action items to take. Do 22 we have a motion? 23 COMMISSIONER FIELDS: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I move that we approve 24 the employee performance evaluation for LaDonna Castañuela and a 6.5% 25 salary increase for LaDonna, effective May 1, 2025. 26 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Commissioners, any discussion?

23 COMMISSIONER STEEN: Second. Sorry. 1 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: All right. Okay. All right. No discussion. 2 3 Do we have a motion? Cindy made the motion. Do we have a second? 4 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Second. CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. All in favor say "aye." 5 (Chorus of "Ayes") 6 7 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Motion passes. 8 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: Thank you, LaDonna. MS. CASTAÑUELA: Thank you. 9 10 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Yes. 11 COMMISSIONER FRANZ: It's been a busy year. MS. CASTAÑUELA: Yes. 12 13 COMMISSIONER STEEN: I didn't mean to cut off your praise. 14 Sorry. 15 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Your guidance at Bingo has been absolutely 16 wonderful and just the time that you've spent here has been obviously 17 quality for the agency, and your being at the helm is such a just night 18 and day difference from those that have been here before. So, we're 19 incredibly grateful for all that you do and the work that you do to help bingo across the State. So LaDonna, thank you very much. Well deserved. 20 21 MS. CASTAÑUELA: Thank you very much. 22 AGENDA ITEM XVI. 23 CHAIRMAN RIVERA: Okay. Alrighty. Commissioners, I believe 24 that this concludes the business of our meeting. Is there a motion to 25 adjourn?
